Selectmen's Report

The Town of Nobleboro had another interesting and challenging year in 2014, beginning with a positive and unremarkable audit report from our outside auditors. Our Town Clerk, Mary Ellen Anderson, had our books ready for the audit in the first week of January as usual; and we are always pleased to start the New Year confident of our financial status.

This year the Budget Committee completed their work right on schedule, giving careful consideration to all sections of our fiscal planning for 2014. Working with the Selectmen, the Fire Department and the School Committee, they produced a proposed budget that was subsequently adopted at our town meeting in March without controversy. The Selectmen wish to thank the Budget Committee, along with all of the other volunteer boards and committees who work diligently throughout the year to accomplish the town's business. These individuals make a significant contribution to the town through their efforts in support of public safety, conservation, our school, planned development, recreation and so many other areas. We wish to recognize them for making Nobleboro a better place in which to live.

In relation to our town meeting, the Selectmen wish to thank everyone who participated in the discussions and voting last March. We depend on Town Meeting to provide us with guidance for the coming year, and we hope to see many of you on March 21, 2015 at 10:00 am at the Nobleboro Central School.

The Selectmen again wish to use this opportunity to acknowledge the staff who make our town office run so well, serving the public daily and helping the Selectmen do their jobs.

This year our biggest challenge involved responding to the unexpected departure of Deputy Clerk Michelle Cameron, leaving Mary Ellen Anderson as our sole office staff employee for a substantial part of 2014. Mary Ellen, already Office Manager, Tax Collector, Treasurer, Town Clerk/Registrar and Secretary to the Board of Selectmen and Budget/Advisory Committee, now had to manage two elections as well as perform all daily customer service alone in the office. While the Selectmen did all that we could to support Mary Ellen during this period, she carried an enormous load until we were able to hire a new deputy clerk. We all should thank her for an exceptional effort on behalf of the town. We also would like to recognize the work of our new Deputy Clerk, Sue Pinnetti-Isabel; our Code Enforcement Officer,

Stanley Waltz; and our Animal Control Officer, Kyle Emerson.

In May the Dow Scholarship Committee awarded one \$1000.00 scholarship to Jalen Lincoln. We wish him the best of luck in his education. George Dow was a great resource for the Town and was always proud of "The Little Town with a Big Heart". Applications for this scholarship and for the Francis and Heather Key Scholarship (both for Nobleboro students only) can be picked up each spring at the Nobleboro Town Office or from your guidance office at your local school.

As always, many thanks go out to all the people of the Nobleboro Fire Department. They are always looking for more members to help them in responding to the approximately 150 fire and EMS calls each year. Anyone interested should stop by the Fire Department on Monday nights, which is their regular meeting and training session.

We give our thanks to all the people who have worked to raise money for the fish ladder restoration project. This year they raised and received grants totaling \$196,405 which allowed them to spend \$281,000 in repair work. Deb Wilson has worked diligently in writing grant proposals to fund the project. Read the fish ladder report that Deb writes which gives you an update on the progress of the project. They would appreciate any help that anyone can give.

The town has a number of properties that classify as non-profits. We want to, once again, recognize Camp Kieve, a non-profit, for giving the town a \$15,000 donation this year in lieu of taxes. We hope that other non-profits might follow their example to help the town with the many services we provide.

The town of Nobleboro is in good shape financially. In 2014 the town saw an increase of \$18,697 in excise tax. Our carry forward at year end was \$504,000. The town did not have to borrow a tax anticipation loan this year. The tax rate this year increased from 9.8 to 10.2 mils.

Don't forget to vote on Friday, March 20th from 12:00 noon to 6:00 pm at the Town Office meeting room and we hope to see you at Town Meeting on March 21st at 10:00 am at the Nobleboro Central School.

In 2014 Bremen Road had a section rebuilt, ditched and culverts were replaced. Paving was done on Bremen Road, Eugley Hill and part of the Upper East Pond Road.

East Neck Road had 80 feet of 36 inch culvert replaced and Vannah Road had two 30 inch culverts replaced. Additional culverts on West Neck Road were also replaced.

Upper Cross Road was cut back to allow safe passage during inclement weather.

Storm damage was repaired as required.

In 2015 the plan is to start the preparation on Bennett Road for paving. Paving will also be started on Duck Puddle.

Ditching is planned for Morgan Hill, Bayview and Belvedere Road. As budget allows, a section of Vannah Road is planned for rebuilding.

Routine maintenance including patching, brush cutting and sign installation and replacement will be carried out as needed.

Laurie McBurnie, thru her work as Chair of the Town Cemetery Committee, learned more and more about Nobleboro families, and will work with Joyce Brown to handle the increasing number of Nobleboro genealogy inquiries, in addition to continuing as Membership chair.

In October our 9th AppleFest revival was enjoyed by over 500 folks, and NHS successfully raised enough funds for the Society's three \$1,000 scholarships and other community activities. We thank all the volunteers who helped with AppleFest, the local businesses that participated and that provided over 100 silent auction items, and the NCS 8th graders for their help. The Society gives \$200 to the NCS 8th graders for their class project and also to Fondy York for the Special Olympics. In 2015 AppleFest is Saturday, October 3rd.

The three 2014 scholarships were awarded to:

- Hannah Boone – Maine College of Art, painting and drawing
- Cassie Lincoln – University of Maine Farmington, elementary education-math
- Caitlin Waltz – University of Maine-Farmington, elementary education

Since 1985 NHS has awarded 75 scholarships for a total of \$56,800 to Nobleboro residents and NHS members. The 2015 scholarship application forms are now available from local high schools or our website, www.nobleborohistoricalsociety.org.

Carolyn Hardman continues to create and coordinate our Nobleboro history classes for Nobleboro Central School students, along with volunteers Britt Hatch, Ann Baldwin, and Barbara Briggs. This year Mrs. Cindy Sabina's 6th graders, Ms. Tamara Kaler's 5th graders, Ms. Avis Ingalls' 2nd graders, and Mrs. Robyn Henry's 1st graders all came to the Historical Center for one of the "Life in Olde Nobleboro" classes.

The five programs for the general public on historical topics relating to the area included: Plants of the Early Colonists and Heirloom Seeds, Local Native Americans in the Colonial Period, Kieve & Wavus Summer Camps on Damariscotta Lake, Nobleboro Cemeteries – Stories about a Few Special Ones, and Colonel David Dunbar and the Re-Settlement of the Pemaquid Peninsula.

The Fish Ladder Restoration Committee, part of the Society, made significant progress with fund-raising and restoration work; see their separate report.

The Historical Center has Open House on Saturday afternoons in July and August and volunteer docents are there to help visitors. The museum is also open almost any time by appointment.

Nobleboro Central School: In March 2014 Nobleboro Central School was named a “High Performing Reward School” by the Maine Department of Education - one of 20 schools in Maine with this designation. Students and staff continue to work hard to support student learning and achieve high standards of academic achievement and citizenship, and the staff continues its efforts on several new initiatives including implementing proficiency (standards) based learning, using technology powerfully, and implementing a new system for teacher evaluation.

NCS continues to benefit from the strong support provided by families, the Nobleboro Parent Teacher Organization, and our many community partners including The Leadership School at Kieve, Skidompha Public Library, the Nobleboro Historical Society, the Nobleboro Fire Department, AOS 93 Adult Education, and the Lincoln County Sheriff’s Office.

Two major maintenance and repair projects were completed this year: renovating the front entrance and painting the exterior of the building. Improvements to lighting and sound systems and interior painting are our next building priorities.

Through continuous learning, improvement, and community involvement, NCS strives to be a center of education for the citizens of Nobleboro.

Grades 9-12: Nobleboro has 66 students in grades 9-12, with 55 attending Lincoln Academy. Seven (7) students attend other private schools and four (4) students are enrolled in other various high school opportunities. These students continue to achieve to high levels. Lincoln Academy continues a very high placement level of students seeking post-secondary learning. The School Boards of the Central Lincoln County School System meet with the Board of Directors of Lincoln Academy a couple times per year in order to align curriculum and prepare for transition of our grade eight students to a successful experience in high school.

Adult and Community Education

CLC Adult and Community Education again provided services to over 800 adults in 2014. We began the new HiSET high school completion program, assisted students who want to go on to college, worked with basic literacy students, provided medical certificate programs and served up a wide variety of enrichment classes for young and old.

We provide basic literacy services along with high school completion classes free of charge in our Learning Center program on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Monday and Tuesday mornings with students from each town in AOS #93 participating in basic education or high school completion classes in 2014. Free College Transitions courses are offered through The Lincoln County College Connection (TLC³) – a cooperative program with 3 other Lincoln County Adult Education programs. Dozens of adults from Lincoln County participated in classes that will help them prepare for college through that program.

In 2014 we helped 12 students complete a high school credential and many more worked on basic literacy and math skills. Anyone 18 or older who is out of school and wants to earn a high school credential or who needs to improve their reading or writing should contact us to get started.

We continue to work with Lincoln County Healthcare to provide vocational training in several medical programs. In 2014 we conducted 3 Certified Nursing Assistant courses with 21 students completing the program and receiving certification and employment. We were also able to offer 5 Certified Residential Medical Assistant and Personal Support Specialist classes with 28 people receiving certification.

Hundreds of students continue to enjoy the more than 90 low-cost, high impact courses offered in Community Education. Community members learned to use an iPad or a digital camera. They also exercised, practiced Tai Chi, cooked, and learned firearm safety among other things.

Winter 2015 School Report for Sending Towns

Lincoln Academy is an independent secondary school chartered in 1801 to serve the midcoast area. It offers a comprehensive program, including courses in the areas of English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, World Languages, Fine and Performing Arts, Technology Education, Physical Education, and Health at all levels. Regional Vocational, Alternative Education and Special Education programs are available. Lincoln Academy is accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC), which reaccredits the school every ten years. The school went through the reaccreditation process in 2014.

In the winter of 2015 two new buildings will open on the Lincoln Academy Campus. The Cable-Burns Applied Technology and Engineering Center (ATEC) will offer approximately 10,000 square feet of classroom space for vocational, science, and technology courses. The new dormitory will house 54 of the 78 residential students expected to attend Lincoln Academy in the fall of 2015.

Governance

Lincoln Academy is governed by an independent Board of Trustees. Officers include: Ann McFarland '73, President; Christine Wajer '85, Vice-President; Dennis Prior '91, Secretary. Members include: Sarah Maurer, Treasurer; Faustine Reny '01, Robert Baldwin '62, Stephen Dixon, George Masters, Jr., Lisa Masters '83, Jon McKane, Karen Moran, William Morgner, and Rob Nelson. David Sturdevant is Head of School.

The Student Body

Lincoln Academy has a current enrollment of 548 students in the 2014-15 school year. The majority of students come from 16 local towns. 64 residential students come from thirteen countries around the world. Lincoln has a goal of enrolling 78 residential students in the fall of 2015.

Graduates

Of the 131 graduates in the Class of 2014, 81 enrolled in post-secondary education - 65 enrolled in 4-year colleges/ universities, 16 enrolled in less than 4-year programs (2 year and certificate programs), 48 are employed/ seeking employment, and 2 enlisted in military service.

Curriculum

Lincoln Academy remains committed to its comprehensive curriculum as we strive to meet the needs of all our students. We have added several

new courses to our 2015-16 course guide, many of which take advantage of the space and tools in the Applied Technology and Engineering Center.

Finances

Unlike most independent schools, The Board does not set day tuition. Because most students' tuition is paid by their sending towns, the tuition is established by the State Department of Education using a formula based on average per pupil expenditures of Maine public high schools during the previous two years. The tuition for the 2014-2015 school year is \$9,754. The Insured Value (IV) factor is an amount in addition to tuition intended to fund capital maintenance and debt service. The legislated IV factor amount of 10% was reduced in 2009 to 5% and remained at 5% through last year. The legislature voted to partially restore the IV by voting to increase the amount to 6% of the calculated tuition figure for 2014-15. While towns are allowed to continue to pay the full 10% and some of our area towns have done that in the past, this year all towns have elected to pay at the 6% rate.

Supporting Lincoln

While the sending towns do pay tuition for each student, that amount is calculated each year by the state. The tuition allowance is simply not enough to provide the quality educational experience that we strive to provide each student. LA depends on support from the Lincoln Fund (aka Annual Fund) to bridge that gap. Private contributions have allowed Lincoln to support both programs and capital improvements. Money raised supports students and faculty, and is vital to the life of the school. Since 1997, over \$1.4M has been contributed to general operations, over \$650K for specific programs, and about \$10M for capital projects. Contributions to annual and capital campaigns provide for major improvements to the LA program and facilities without increasing local taxes.

Nobleboro/Jefferson Transfer Facility

The Transfer Station, operated by Nobleboro and Jefferson, and under contract with Bremen, Damariscotta and Newcastle, provides for the disposal of most types of solid waste generated in the five towns. This year our household waste went to PERC in Orrington. The construction and demolition bulky materials are hauled to a landfill in Norridgewock. We use the services of Lincoln County Recycling to recycle cardboard, newspaper, plastic and many other products. They also recycle our universal hazard waste (televisions, computers, fluorescent light bulbs, mercury switches and rechargeable batteries).

In 2014 Barry Howell spent his first year as manager of the facility. He has done a great job in making the transfer station run smoothly. Barry has put emphasis on safety, organization and appearance of the facility. Barry, along with assistant manager Brandon Achorn and newly hired Linwood Rideout, has done a great job keeping it running smoothly.

We purchased two new containers to haul demolition in 2014. We also did a small section of the driveway with hot top. Next year we hope to hot top the whole road coming into the transfer station. The new office, built in 2013, has worked really well.

We increased our recyclables by 80 tons this year. This is very important because it saves the towns close to \$90 per ton. This increase is due to the efforts of the public and our staff in educating what can actually be recycled.

The Transfer Station is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. The front gate is closed at 3:50 p.m. each night to allow time to close out the computer. We are closed on Sunday and Monday. This allows our staff to have two days off in a row.

We will continue to review our operations in an effort to provide good service and the most efficient Transfer Station possible. We are interested in your comments and recommendations and will attempt to incorporate them whenever possible.

Great Salt Bay Sanitary District

Great Salt Bay Sanitary District (GSBSD) is a publicly owned, quasi-municipal utility organized to provide safe drinking water in Damariscotta and Newcastle, and to provide wastewater treatment services in the Towns of Damariscotta, Newcastle, and Nobleboro. The District currently has 713 water customers and 1428 wastewater users. Scott Abbotoni is the Water Manager, overseeing all water operations, and LeeAnna Libby is the Wastewater Manager, overseeing all wastewater operations.

Our mission is to provide safe drinking water, adequate fire protection, and effective wastewater treatment. The District is committed to public health, customer service, and environmental protection.

The Drinking Water Division's water supply is "Little Pond," a pristine, 77-acre spring-fed pond, with an ultraviolet lightwater treatment system as a primary disinfectant and chlorine as a secondary disinfectant.

The Welton Tank on Standpipe Rd. in Damariscotta and the Academy Hill Tank in Newcastle feed the Twin Villages equalizing the water distribution system while adding extra fire protection. (Generators provide backup power to all areas of the system.)

In 2014 the Water Division worked in conjunction with the town of Damariscotta, under a CDBG funded project. The District's portion of the project was to replace 1800' of old 6" cast iron, leaded joint pipe along Church, Chapman, and Pleasant Streets with new 8" high density polyethylene pipe. In the process all customer service connections were replaced as well as fire hydrants. The upsizing of the pipe should yield better fire flows and less disinfection byproduct issues, and decrease the need for repairs to the water main in that area.

The District also enlisted the help of the engineering firm of Tata & Howard to perform a Capital Efficiency Plan to plan for future projects, based on problem areas, pipe ages, and a hydraulic study done on the system.

The Wastewater Division's wastewater treatment for the Damariscotta and Newcastle consist of three aerated lagoons with a capacity of eight million gallons.

The wastewater is disinfected with household bleach (average use per day is 3 gallons).

In order to shorten the distribution system, in 2014 the District moved

an old 8x8 chlorine storage building 1200 ft. It now sits next to the chlorine contact chamber.

The lagoons were cleaned, the aeration system was upgraded and the lagoon liners were inspected in 2012.

The Damariscotta Mills area of Newcastle and Nobleboro has a small sand filter, fed by septic tanks, which are maintained by the district.

The Great Salt Bay Sanitary District's operations are carried out by five full-time employees overseen by an elected six-member Board of Trustees. Representing Damariscotta are William Brewer, John Gallagher, and Raymond McConnell; representing Newcastle are Christopher Hayden and Alan Ray; and representing Nobleboro is Robert Whear. The Trustees meet the second Wednesday each month, 5 p.m. at the District office, located at 121 Piper Mill Road, Damariscotta. The public is encouraged to attend. Office hours are Monday – Friday 7:00 am -3:00 pm.

Code Officer Report

This past year the Town had a 17% increase in building permits and land use permits. I issued 90 permits in 2014 compared to 77 permits in 2013 and 62 permits in 2012. Permits for this year included: 6 new homes, 2 mobile homes, 6 demo permits, 9 timber harvesting, 30 shoreland zone, and 37 others that included garages, additions, signs, accessory buildings and others. I also issued 16 septic permits and 21 interior permits.

This year we used the new property maintenance ordinance to enforce compliance with property in Town. I am working on two others at this time. You will see in the Planning Board report that activity has picked up with that Board as well. They are a dedicated group and are working hard to make positive changes for the betterment of Nobleboro

As you read my report, please be aware that we have to vote in the new FEMA flood maps, these will be the July 16th 2015 version. The new maps will be digital and much easier to read and use. The State and Town will be holding public meetings on the revised maps. If you are in the shoreland zone and have any questions, I encourage you to attend and ask questions on flood insurance or any other issue you may have. Watch the local paper for meeting dates.

Damariscotta Lake Watershed Association

The Town of Nobleboro's \$2,000 distribution to the Damariscotta Lake Watershed Association (DLWA) was combined with distributions from other municipalities to fund sampling of water quality and to remove the aquatic invasive plant known as Hydrilla first found growing in Cranberry Cove in 2009 and in Davis Stream in 2011. Both of these water bodies are connected to Damariscotta Lake. Hydrilla is sometimes referred to as the *Godzilla of invasive aquatic plants* since it can grow up to a foot a day. Your support was essential to the work of keeping the plant from spreading and to keep the lake as clean and clear as possible.

Cranberry Cove: In June 2014, a pond liner was manufactured specifically for placement within the cove where Hydrilla was first found by DLWA volunteer Dick Butterfield in 2009. The new liner is designed to smother the invasive plant, reduce plant growth to a minimum and create more efficient monitoring. This method has been used successfully in Vermont for the control of Variable-Leaf Milfoil, but it was the first time it was deployed in Maine and the first time it was used to control Hydrilla. Early results indicate the liner has been effective in limiting the invasive plant's growth. Monitoring will be essential to document whether or not this trend will continue.

The rip-rap barrier completed at the cove in 2010 remains intact, helping to isolate the cove from the rest of the lake. However, the cove's isolation was not complete during intermittent high water levels in the summer of 2014, creating risk.

Davis Stream: Staff and volunteers conducted weekly monitoring of this site throughout the growing season (14 weeks). *No Hydrilla was found and the cove was open to surface water use for the first time since monitoring began 5 years ago.*

Lake-wide Work: Each summer DLWA staff trains and coordinates over 100 volunteers for our Invasive Plant Patrol. Staff and volunteers paddle a portion of the 44 mile shoreline using specialized scopes (provided by the Reny Family Foundation and Horizon Foundation) looking for any invasive plants. This year we increased the amount of shoreline surveyed from 33% to 50%. *No additional invasive plants were found.*

In addition, we monitored water quality in each of the 3 basins of

the lake. In 2014 we expanded testing to include various chemicals and pollutants (funded by the Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund). Studies have shown that when phosphorus levels reach 20 ppb in the water column, it can result in reduced water clarity, algae blooms and fish kills. *Current phosphorus levels indicate Damariscotta Lake appears stable but at risk.* Detailed information can be found at dlwa.org.

Private funding and highly trained volunteers allowed DLWA to survey areas where soil is eroding within the watershed and carrying phosphorus into the lake. We have plans in 2015 to help reduce erosion and phosphorus going into the lake.

Pemaquid Watershed Association

The Pemaquid Watershed Association (PWA) asks the Town of Nobleboro to appropriate \$500 to our Water Quality and Land Use Program for 2015. This is the same amount requested by PWA and granted by the Town for the past seven years. We are making a similar request to four other towns with acreage within the Pemaquid River watershed: Bremen, Damariscotta, Bristol, and South Bristol.

The major programs that PWA administers annually that benefit the Town of Nobleboro are:

(1) Providing free-of-charge to Nobleboro residents comprehensive informational packets on pond stewardship, best land-use practices to minimize pollution, boating and fishing regulations, and boating safety.

(2) Coordinated meetings for citizens with specific interest in Pemaquid and Duckpuddle Ponds. The purpose of these “PWA Ponders” gatherings is to educate about pond management and to share concerns and updates about conservation efforts.

(3) Implementation of the Courtesy Boat Inspection program at the Pemaquid Pond boat launch to educate boaters and help minimize the risk of spreading invasive plants, which benefits water quality, recreational values, and waterfront property values.

(4) Implementation of the LakeSmart Program, which provides free, individualized technical assistance to pondside residents about property-care practices that help safeguard the quality of the ponds.

(5) And, new this year, “Keep Pemaquid Peninsula Beautiful” (KPPB) became an official Affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, giving PWA access to grants that will bring the Town of Nobleboro the opportunity to receive free, tangible items to help reduce and prevent litter (such as large beverage can recycling bins,, which this year the Town of Nobleboro chose not to receive). Via the KPPB initiative, PWA will be bringing more benefit than ever to the Town of Nobleboro. For example, currently the KPPB Steering Committee is working on an informational brochure about the recycling and disposal options at the local transfer stations, which will supplement the existing handout provided by the Nobleboro-Jefferson Transfer Station.

Thank you for your support of our mission that serves to improve the quality of life for Nobleboro residents and visitors by keeping the land and water clean and healthy.

Central Lincoln County Ambulance

I would like to reflect on some of the changes in our service since we incorporated in 1972. Although our service was up and running many years before that staffed by a few dedicated and caring individuals, sometimes arriving in a hearse! We have certainly grown over the last four decades. Some of you may have even been involved from the start when you would answer the call from a red phone in your home. The red phone system eventually grew to where a red phone would be in place, at houses all over the local area. Care and equipment, although modern, were bare minimum in those days. A priority was placed on transport to the local hospital. The attendants would ring the buzzer at the back door to the emergency room (literally one room). The RN on duty would then come down and let the crew in and call the doctor at home to come in if needed.

One thing that has not changed is the dedication and caring of the staff members. I am not clear on how the history of our motto came to be, but “Neighbors Helping Neighbors” has been the center of our service.

Fast forward to today and we are currently located in central Damariscotta, with ease of access to all the communities that we serve. Our location and building were made possible by several generous benefactors in 1999. Over the years individuals and groups have come together and supported the service to help make us a success. One area of support has always been the local businesses; they have made donations in kind as well as allowing employees to leave work to answer a call.

Currently we have five ambulances, one of which is a larger box that doubles as a critical care transport vehicle. It has a current replacement value of \$140,000.00. We are using state of the art cardiac monitors that can perform 12 lead EKGs and transmit data to the emergency room doctor. They have a replacement cost of \$28,000.00. We are making use of the new iPad tele-medicine for a real time video face-to-face with the ER doctors through a generous donation. We have a large compliment of medications and trained EMTs and Paramedics to handle a wide range of both medical and trauma related emergencies. Currently we are in the second year of our pilot program of Community Paramedicine. This free program allows us to make home visits at the request and guidance of your primary care physician. We have been making visits and a wide range of tasks, ranging from blood draws for lab work to wound and assessment care.

We have certainly grown over the years to the point that we are a rolling ICU, but have not lost sight that helping people is our ultimate goal. It is the caring of the communities that help make us a success. I would like to thank you for all of your generous and continued support.

Lincoln County Television

Lincoln County Television (LCTV), established in 1991, is a non-profit organization that manages Public Access Channel 7 on Time Warner Cable for 10 towns in Lincoln County: Alna, Bristol, Damariscotta, Dresden, Edgecomb, Newcastle, Nobleboro, Waldoboro, Westport Island, and Wiscasset. The cable channel currently reaches about 11,200 individuals in our community and our locally produced programs are available to untold numbers worldwide via the internet at www.lctv.org.

Highlights from 2014:

Recognizing that local organizations would like to produce video for the community, but were lacking volunteers willing to learn how to produce video, LCTV began offering production services for a fee. Some of the programs produced in 2014 were *Colonial Pemaquid: Outpost on the 17th Century Maine Frontier* (produced for Friends of Colonial Pemaquid); *Russia!*, Bristol Consolidated School's annual diversity show; and *No Place Like Home II*, the second of Mid-Coast Energy System's series of shows dedicated to helping the elderly stay in their homes.

Notable productions by volunteers in 2014 included the Maine Coast Book Shop's *Firehouse Forums* produced by Jack Peters; *Waldoboro Baseball* produced by Al Dickey; a series of parenting shows from Healthy Kids produced by Athena Taylor; town events from Waldoboro produced by Caren Clark; Bristol Area Lions Speak-Out produced by Dave Kolodin, GSB Graduation and the GSB Spring Concert produced by Ann Pinkham, several annual town meetings produced by Mary Ellen Crowley; an election candidates forum produced by Scott Schott; and *In Celebration of Life - Susan E. Ghoreyeb* produced by Jim Buckingham. *Wuzzup News*, produced by Jack Peters, is now in its 7th year and in 2014 expanded its audience by airing on Maine Coast TV, the community television station for Knox County.

LCTV also receives video from individuals and organizations who do it all on their own. Keith O'Leary developed and produced two episodes of *Cowshit Corner* (our own local reality show); Art Mayers continues to add to his Lincoln County Oral History series (there are now 31 of them); Chris Feltis, Rodney Waltz and Blake Griffin Dodge entertain us with the Lincoln Academy Basketball games (seen on LCTV since 1984); St. Patrick's Catholic Church, Edgecomb Congregational Church and Faith

Baptist Church in Newcastle record their weekly services, and the towns of Bristol, Damariscotta, Newcastle, Waldoboro, and Wiscasset inform the voters with selectboard and other government meetings.

Altogether, 38 individuals and organizations produced a total of 98 one-time shows and 15 weekly or biweekly shows for a total of 509 new hours of programming, 434 hours of which are available on the LCTV Video on Demand page.

Over 200 postings were made to the LCTV Electronic Bulletin Board by 32 local organizations.

Thanks to Hagar Enterprises (an LCTV sponsor), LCTV now has a nice, big parking lot in back of the station.

None of the above would be possible without the talents of local producers and support from the towns and business sponsors (Mid-Coast Energy Systems, First Federal Savings, and Hagar Enterprises). “Video by the people, for the people” makes for a vibrant and engaged public -please consider becoming a LCTV producer or sponsor in 2015!

Nobleboro-Newcastle Fish Agent

This past spring was successful for both harvesting and passing alewives into Damariscotta Lake. During the 16 days we could harvest, we sold 1016 bushels of fish for bait, as well as dipping 28 bushels for widow's orders. We tried something new this year, developing a relationship with the South Bristol Coop in which they agreed to purchase any alewives we had remaining after our sales to lobstermen. This enabled us to sell an additional 330 bushels that in the past we would have left in the river. Hopefully this relationship will continue this season, and perhaps we will expand to other markets as well.

In 2014 we patched and repaired the dippers, purchased a second new hoist, and cobbled together the conveyor for the season. 2015 will undoubtedly come with more of the same annual repair work, but there are a couple other projects that will need to be addressed sooner than later. The concrete structure which is part of the dipper/hopper area is badly undermined by the Middle Stream and is likely to begin to collapse in the near future. If this happens, the dippers will likely be unusable. Of more immediate concern is the concrete walkway between the check office and the harvest area. It, too, is showing the effects of being located at the base of a water fall for the last 60 years and has started to collapse. At some point, it will become impassable and this will put an end to the harvest. Hopefully we can begin to address these issues this year.

With the newly restored fish ladder working as well as it is, it seems possible that we will have the ability to harvest many more alewives than we are currently and still get sizable numbers into the lake to spawn. Hopefully we can turn the fishery back into a source of income for the towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle.

For a lot of folks, the alewife run is something to go have a look at between Mother's Day and beginning of June. While those few weeks might be the busiest, there are endless hours dedicated at the fish ladder during the entire year that make it possible. Deb Wilson, Kurt Omhe and Leigh Morrill can't be thanked enough. Kurt was very involved in the harvest this year; Eben Wilson and JB Smith pitched in as well. Thanks to Jim Brinkler for his dedication to the harvest and fish ladder. Finally special thanks to Stan Waltz for the years he dedicated to being a great fish agent for the town of Nobleboro.

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration – 2014

With the successful completion of the 2014 project, the fish ladder restoration is nearly finished. Since 2007, we have re-built 68 pools so that we now have an efficient fish ladder that will work well for decades to come. All that remains to be completed is more capping and the construction of one more pool at the bottom of the ladder. The work is a collaboration of the Towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle and the Nobleboro Historical Society.

In 2014, the lowest and final sixteen pools in the fish ladder were re-built during the winter and early spring and the capping was completed on an additional 30 pools that had been previously constructed. Jorgensen Landscaping of Bath again carried out the project. The Jorgensen crew built a huge plastic tent over the work area and, heated with propane heaters, they worked (almost) comfortably through some challenging winter weather. The work is truly exceptional and it's been enjoyed by thousands of visitors as well as the fish.

The success of the fish ladder restoration is measured by the number of alewives reaching Damariscotta Lake to spawn. In 2014, a total of 1,066,314 alewives were counted! It's unlikely that more than a million fish ever reached the lake to spawn, even in the glory days of fish harvesting during the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The fish ladder now works efficiently and the fish have responded. We should have great runs now into the foreseeable future.

In 2013-2014, we had help from a number of foundations including the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, the Sewell Foundation, the Horizon Foundation, the Davis Conservation Foundation, and the Edward A. Myers Marine Conservation Fund. In addition, area businesses helped enormously with donations and sponsorships. Finally, many, many individuals volunteered their help at festivals and other events, made donations, and came to enjoy the rewards of all this work. We, as a community, have preserved our historic fish ladder and the alewives and other fish that rely on it for passage between fresh and salt water.

Thanks to one and all—we did it!! We now have some finishing touches to complete in the coming years.

Office of the Sheriff Lincoln County, Maine

Sheriff Todd B. Brackett and his staff wish to thank the citizens of Nobleboro for their support and make the following report for 2014.

The Sheriff's Office responded to 1,354 calls for service for the Town of Nobleboro. This number is a slight decrease from 2013. The calls include 54 Traffic Accidents, 117 Reports/ Investigation of crimes against individuals/property, 521 Property checks, 227 Traffic Assists/Offenses, 16 9-1-1 Hang Up Investigations, 56 Business/Residential Alarms and 35 assists to residents. The numbers you see above are only a partial listing of actual services provided in 2014.

The Special Services Division is comprised of the Detective Division, Transport Division and Court Security. This Division is commanded by Lieutenant Michael Murphy. The Detective Division continues its quest to solve major property crimes and crimes committed against children. The Detective Division also supports other law enforcement agencies within the county when requested.

The Transport Team works extremely hard on the diversion program, reducing the cost of housing inmates at Two Bridges Regional Jail. The diversion program continues to save the County of Lincoln thousands of dollars in incarceration costs. Deputy James Read continues to excel in managing inmates on diversion contracts, lowering the number of bed days that they would be housed at TBRJ. Eleanor Grover and her work crew continue to save non-profit organizations in Lincoln County money, by providing no cost inmate labor.

The Patrol Division, commanded by Lieutenant Rand Maker, continues on its steady and increasing pace of responding to day-to-day calls for service. The Sheriff's Office in 2014, received another block of grants from the Maine Department of Public Safety to conduct seatbelt, speed and OUI enforcement details. The details paid for by the grant, focus solely on enforcement of those areas which are most commonly reported on day-to-day complaints. These details do not interfere with the patrol division's day-to-day calls for service.

In January of 2014, Deputy Matthew Day was promoted by Sheriff Brackett to the rank of Sergeant. Sergeant Day's knowledge and dedication to duty is a great addition to the supervisory team at the Sheriff's Office.

In April of 2014, Ryan Chubbuck was hired as a full time Patrol Deputy. In January of 2015, Ryan will attend the Maine Criminal Justice Academy 18 week Basic Law Enforcement Training Program (B.L.E.T.P.) in order to obtain his full time law enforcement certification.

Sergeant Jason Nein was assigned duties at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy as a Cadre for the B.L.E.T.P. As a cadre, Sergeant Nein is responsible for training and molding new law enforcement recruits from all law enforcement agencies within the State of Maine. Sergeant Nein's dedication to his assigned task is noteworthy.

In 2014, K-9 Duke and his handler Deputy Kevin Dennison completed the required training to be certified as a law enforcement police K-9 team. Since their certification, Deputy Dennison and Duke have done many K-9 Tracks and article searches with great success.

Distracted driving continues to be one of the leading causation factors for motor vehicle crashes. Please don't be a statistic, pay attention to your driving. Your life or the life of another person could depend on it.

The Sheriff's Office Administrative Division continues to serve the public's needs regarding civil process issues and questions about reports taken by deputies. Karen, Amy and Penny will be happy to assist in any way they can.

The Civil Division remains steady with civil paperwork service throughout the county. There were 76 civil papers served in Nobleboro in 2014.

As your Sheriff, it remains a priority to keep the lines of communication open to each citizen I serve. Please do not hesitate to bring your public safety concerns to me directly or to any member of my staff. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office cares about its reputation, our community and the people we serve.

Dear Friends:

In November, the people of Maine entrusted me to serve another term in the United States Senate. A museum recognizing the contributions of American women is long overdue, and this bill is an important first step toward that goal.

To date, Maine has received more than \$90 million for highway, bridge, airport, rail, and port projects through the successful TIGER grant program.

Working to address pressing issues facing our seniors, from long-term care and retirement security to the vast potential of biomedical research, will be on our agenda. Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town

of Nobleboro as of December 30, 2014 and 2013, and the respective changes in financial position, and where applicable, cash flows thereof for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Nobleboro's basic financial statements. The introductory section, combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements, and statistical section are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements.

The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

The introductory and statistical sections have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

Town of Nobleboro Management's Discussion and Analysis
Year Ended December 31, 2014

As management of the Town of Nobleboro, Maine, we offer readers of the Town of Nobleboro, Maine's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town of Nobleboro for the year ended December 31, 2014. We encourage readers to consider the information presented in conjunction with additional information that we have furnished in our letter of transmittal, the basic financial statements, and the accompanying notes to those financial statements.

ADMINISTRATIVE NOTES

Town Office

In 2014 we saw a lot of changes in the town office staff. Mary Ellen Anderson was the one constant staff member for the entire year. Michelle Cameron was with us for the first half of the year but then moved on to the Damariscotta Town Office. Michelle was with us for 4½ years and did an excellent job. After a few changes, we hired Susan Pinnetti-Isabel to a full time position. Many thanks go to Mary Ellen for keeping the office running in a very difficult year. To top off the year, Mary Ellen and Sue had to run the November election with no power.

Nobleboro Volunteer Fire Department

The Fire Department does a great job in servicing the Town with fire protection and EMT response. It has become a challenge for volunteer firefighters and EMTs to keep up with all the certifications that are mandated by insurances, OSHA, and the State Labor Department.

Since January 1, 2010 Ryan Gallagher has assumed the role of Chief, with over 160 fire and EMS calls this year. We have 68,736 left on the loan for the truck purchased last year. It will be paid off in 2016.

Dow Scholarship

In May the Board of Selectmen presented one 1,000.00 scholarship to Jalen Lincoln. We wish him the best of luck in his education and future endeavors. We currently have a balance of 23,464.07 in this account. George Dow was a great resource for the Town and was always proud of "The Little Town with a Big Heart".

Frances and Heather Key Scholarship

In 2014 the school was notified that they had been given 50,000.00 to establish the Frances and Heather Key Scholarship. The Scholarship will be for high school graduates and will be awarded as the income from the fund increases. We hope to be able to award scholarships on a yearly basis.

Fish Stream Restoration Project

A very active group of people, headed by Deb Wilson, worked hard to raise a lot of money to rebuild the fish ladder. The fish ladder is the stream that allows the alewives to pass from the Damariscotta River into the Damariscotta Lake to spawn in the spring. The fish ladder was in need of a lot of repairs.

In 2014 the group took in 196,405 in grants, donations and sales. Along with a balance forward of 126,390 they had 322,785 to work with. In 2014 they spent

281,835 in major reconstruction of the lower pools. This has almost completed the reconstruction of all the pools.

With a balance at the end of the year of 40,956 they will be doing some minor work to finish the lower pools. If you have not visited the fish ladder since this work began, you should take time to view the magnificent work that has been done.

Overview of Finances

The economy seems to be improving. In 2014 we saw excise tax increase by 6.25% for a total of 20,765.87. We also saw a decrease in outstanding property taxes at the end of 2014. This helped increase our unappropriated surplus to 504,000. The Town was able to go thru 2014 without borrowing on a tax anticipation loan.

The tax rate for 2014 was 10.1 mils, an increase from 2013 of .3 mils. The increase was mainly from the education part of our budget.

The Town has very little debt. We owe two yearly payments on the fire truck for a total of 68,736.

Overall the Town of Nobleboro is in very good shape financially with little debt and a healthy surplus. This makes for a good financial situation for the Town.

It is very important that you come to town meeting to vote on the 2015 budget.

THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements presented herein include all the activities of the Town of Nobleboro, Maine (the Town) using the integrated approach as prescribed by GASB Statement No. 34.

The Government-Wide Financial Statements present the financial picture of the Town from the economic resources measurement focus using the accrual basis of accounting. They present governmental activities and business-type activities separately. These statements include all assets of the Town (including infrastructure) as well as all liabilities (including long-term debt). Additionally, certain eliminations have occurred as prescribed by the statement in regards to interfund activity, payables, and receivables.

The Fund Financial Statements include statements for each of the three categories of activities - governmental, business-type, and fiduciary. The governmental activities are prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus and modified accrual basis of accounting. The business-type activities are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The fiduciary activities are agency funds, which only report a balance sheet and do not have a measurement focus. Reconciliation of the Fund Financial Statements to the Government-Wide Financial Statements is provided to explain the differences created by the integrated approach.

REPORTING THE TOWN AS A WHOLE

The Statement of Net Position (see Exhibit A) and the Statement of Activities (see Exhibit B) report information about the Town as a whole and its activities. These statements include all assets and liabilities of the Town using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private sector companies. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account

regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Town's Net Position and changes to it. Net Position is the difference between assets and liabilities, which is one way to measure the Town's financial health or financial position. Over time, increases and decreases in the Town's Net Position are indicators of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Other factors to consider are changes to the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's infrastructure.

In the Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities we separate the Town's basic governmental activities as:

Property taxes, excise taxes, fees, interest income, and state and federal grants finance these activities. Detail relating to the activities is in Schedules A-2 and A-4.

Business-type activities include the Nobleboro/Jefferson Transfer Station. Both Towns share and operate this as a business entity. Details of this activity are in Schedule A-15.

REPORTING THE TOWN'S MOST SIGNIFICANT FUNDS

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the most significant funds, not the Town as a whole. Management established many funds to help it control and manage money for particular purposes to show that it is meeting legal responsibilities for using certain taxes, grants, or other money.

Governmental Funds - All of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed shorter-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides.

Governmental fund information helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent on the near future to finance the Town's programs. The differences of results in the Governmental Fund financial statements to those in the Government-Wide financial statements are explained in reconciliation statements.

THE TOWN AS A WHOLE

(Government-Wide Financial Analysis)

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of the Town's financial position. In the case of Nobleboro, assets exceed liabilities by 4,500,383.03 at the close of calendar year 2014 compared to 4,395,333.96 at the close of 2013. This shows an increase in net position of 105,049.07 for the year 2014.

The current assets are down by 201,330.36 because decreases in cash on hand exceeded increases to accounts receivable. The capital assets were up 240,286.93.

This was because of the improvements done at the Transfer Facility, Fish Ladder, and paving that were done in the current year. This makes our total assets up by 38,956.57.

Our current debt is 66,786.58. The Town has not had any long-term debt since 2010 until 2013 when we borrowed 100,000.00 for a new fire truck. Even with the funds borrowed our liabilities have decreased by 66,092.50. This was the result of starting payments for the fire truck loan and a reduction in the amount the general fund owed to other funds.

Governmental Activities

The cost of all Governmental Activities was 4,393,184.83. Charges for services of 77,855.61, operating grants and contributions of 602,164.60, and capital grants and contributions of 222,697.86 reduced the cost to the Town to 3,490,466.76 that we financed by property taxes. The Town's programs listed below show the net costs (total cost less revenues generated by the activities.) The net cost shows the financial burden that was placed on the Town's taxpayers by each of the functions with a comparison to 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014.

Notes to Financial Statements – December 31, 2014

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The accounting policies of the Town of Nobleboro conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units.

1. Financial Reporting Entity

The Town of Nobleboro was incorporated in 1788. The Town operates under a town meeting form of government.

In evaluating the Town of Nobleboro as a reporting entity, management has addressed all potential component units. The primary criteria for including a component reporting entity are the exercise of financial accountability by the Town of Nobleboro's municipal officials.

The Town's financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is responsible for establishing Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for state and local governments through its pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations). Governments are also required to follow the pronouncements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued through November 30, 1989 (when applicable) that do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant accounting policies established in GAAP are used by the Town as discussed below.

In June 1999, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) unanimously approved Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments. Certain significant changes in the Statement include the following:

1.) Financial statements now include:

- A Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) section providing an analysis of the Town's overall financial position and results of operations.
- Financial statements prepared using full accrual accounting for all of the Town's activities, including infrastructure (roads, bridges, etc.).

2.) A change in the fund financial statements to focus on the major funds.

2. Basic Financial Statements - Government-Wide Statements

The Town's basic financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the Town as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the Town's major funds). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements categorize primary activities as governmental. The Town's fire protection, recreation, public works, and general administrative services are classified as governmental activities.

In the government-wide Statements of Net Position, the governmental column is presented on a consolidated basis by column, and is reported on a full accrual, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The Town's net position is reported in three parts - net invested in capital assets; restricted; and unassigned. The Town first utilizes restricted resources to finance qualifying activities.

The government-wide Statements of Activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the Town's functions and business-type activities (fire, public works, administrative, etc.). The functions are also supported by general government revenues (property, certain intergovernmental revenues, fines, permits, and charges, etc.). The Statements of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation) by related program revenues, and operating and capital grants. Program revenues must be directly associated with the function (fire, public works, etc.). Operating grants include operating-specific and discretionary (either operating or capital) grants while the capital grants column reflects capital-specific grants.

The net costs (by function or business-type activity) are normally covered by general revenue (property, intergovernmental revenues, interest income, etc.).

This government-wide focus is more on the sustainability of the Town as an entity and the change in the Town's net position resulting from the current year's activities.

3. Basic Financial Statements - Fund Financial Statements

The financial transactions of the Town are reported in individual funds in the fund financial statements. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures/expenses. The various funds are reported by generic classification within the financial statements.

The following fund types are used by the Town:

a. Governmental Funds:

The focus of the governmental funds' measurement (in the fund statements) is upon determination of financial position and changes in financial position (sources, uses, and balances of financial resources) rather than upon net income. The following is a description of the governmental funds of the Town:

1. General Fund:

General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

2. Fiduciary Funds:

Fiduciary Funds are used to report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore are not available to support Town programs. The reporting focus is on net position and changes in net position and is reported using accounting principles similar to proprietary funds.

The emphasis in fund financial statements is on the major funds in either the governmental or business-type activities categories. Nonmajor funds by category are summarized into a single column. GASB No. 34 sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, liabilities, revenues, or expenditures/expenses of either fund category) for the determination of major funds.

The Town's fiduciary funds are presented in the fiduciary fund financial statements. Since by definition these assets are being held for the benefit of a third party and cannot be used to address activities or obligations of the government, these funds are not incorporated into the government-wide statements.

3. Proprietary Fund:

The Proprietary Fund is the fund used to account for all financial resources relating to the Nobleboro-Jefferson Transfer Facility. The generally accepted accounting principles applicable are those similar to business in the private sector.

4. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures/expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made regardless of the measurement focus applied:

a. Accrual:

Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements and fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

b. Modified Accrual:

The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e. both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt, if any, is recognized when due.

5. Financial Statement Amounts

a. Cash and Cash Equivalents:

The Town has defined cash and cash equivalents to include cash on hand, demand deposits, and cash with fiscal agents. Statutes authorize the Treasurer of the Town, as directed by the municipal officers, to invest all municipal funds, including reserve and trust funds, to the extent that the terms of the instrument, order, or article creating the fund do not prohibit the investment in financial institutions as described in Section 5706 MRSA and securities as described in Sections 5711 through 5717 MRSA.

b. Investments:

Investments, including deferred compensation and pension funds, are stated at cost.

c. Capital Assets:

Capital Assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of 2,000.00 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings	20-50 Years	Machinery and Equipment	3-10 Years

d. Revenues:

Substantially, all governmental fund revenues are accrued. Property taxes are billed and collected within the same period in which the taxes are levied. In applying GASB No. 33 to grant revenues, the provider recognizes liabilities and expenses and the recipient recognizes receivables and revenue when the applicable eligibility requirements, including time requirements, are met. Resources transmitted before the eligibility requirements are met are reported as advances by the provider and deferred revenue by the recipient.

e. Expenditures:

Expenditures are recognized when the related fund liability is incurred. Inventory costs are reported in the period when inventory items are used, rather than in the period purchased.

f. Fund Balance:

In accordance with GASB Statement No. 54, the Town employs terminology and classifications for fund balance items as follows:

Nonexpendable fund balances include amounts that are not expected to be converted to cash, or that are legally required to be maintained intact. The fund balance of the Town's Trust Funds are classified as nonexpendable.

Restricted fund balances are amounts that can be used only for specific purposes because of legislation or restrictions imposed by donors. The fund balances of the Special Revenue Funds are classified as restricted.

Committed fund balances are amounts that can be used only for specific purposes because of a formal action taken by town government. Budget carry forward amounts (other than the school budget), the fund balances in the Capital Projects Fund, and the Cemetery Maintenance Fund are in this category.

Assigned fund balances are resources that are constrained by the government's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed.

Unassigned fund balance is all amounts in the General Fund that are not assigned to another category. Only the General Fund can have an unassigned fund balance.

g. Compensated Absences:

The Town accrues accumulated unpaid vacation and sick leave and associated employee-related costs when earned (or estimated to be earned) by the employee. The noncurrent portion (the amount estimated to be used in subsequent fiscal years) for governmental funds is maintained separately and represents a reconciling item between the fund and government-wide presentations.

h. Use of Estimates:

The presentation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE B - CASH:

Cash

The Town’s cash is categorized to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the Town at year-end. These Categories are defined as follows:

Category #1 - Insured or collateralized with securities held by the Town or by its agent in the Town’s name.

Category #2 - Collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution’s trust department or agent in the Town’s name.

Category #3 - Uncollateralized (This includes any bank balance that is collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution, or by its trust department or agent but not in the Town’s name.)

Historically, the Town has not appropriated funds for abatements but rather funds the expenditures through other unappropriated revenues or undesignated fund balance. The other expenditures exceeded appropriations and were over expended due to higher than anticipated cost or reduction in State payments for Town Road assistance.

NOTE H - DEFERRED TAX REVENUE:

The deferred tax revenue shown on the balance sheet represents prepayments on 2015 taxes of 6,340.71 and property taxes previously assessed of 204,493.93 not

anticipated to be collected within 60 days after the year end.

The National Council on Governmental Accounting (N.C.G.A.) Interpretation No. 3 requires that property tax revenue only be recognized to the extent it will be collected within 60 days following the year end.

Property taxes are recognized when they become available. Available includes those taxes expected to be collected within 60 days after the year end as stated above. Delinquent taxes are considered fully collectible and therefore no allowance for uncollectible taxes is provided.

NOTE I - REVENUE RECOGNITION - PROPERTY TAXES:

The Town's property tax for the current year was levied June 12, 2014 on the assessed value listed as of April 1, 2014 for all taxable real and personal property located in the town. Taxes were due on September 30, 2014 with interest at 7.00% per annum or part thereof commencing October 1, 2014. Liens are filed on any real property where taxes remain unpaid between eight and twelve months after the levy date.

NOTE J - INTERFUND RECEIVABLES AND PAYABLES:

As of December 31, 2014, the General Fund owed 112,461.62 to the Special Revenue Fund and 494.72 to the Trust Fund.

NOTE K - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN:

Public school teachers contribute to the Maine Public Employees Retirement System ("System"), an agent multiple-employer public employee retirement system that acts as a common investment and administrative agent for public school teachers, state employees (except as members of the judiciary and legislature who are covered under the Judicial and Legislative Retirement Systems) and political subdivisions. The System also provides retirement, death, disability, and health insurance benefits. These benefit provisions and all other requirements are established by state statute. The MainePERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the teachers group. This report may be obtained by calling 1-800-451-9800.

Teachers are required to contribute 7.65% of their annual salary to the System. The Town of Nobleboro School Department is required to pay 2.65% of teachers' payroll which is reflected in expenses on the Statement of Revenues and Expenditures. The only exception is the additional contribution required for federally funded teachers for which the Town contributes 13.5% of their compensation and is charged to the grant. This cost amounted to 5,295.00 for the year ended December 31, 2014. The State of Maine contributes the remaining amounts necessary to fund the System, using the actuarial basis specified by statute. The covered payroll for teachers is approximately 952,547.00. As required by Accounting Standards, the amount paid on behalf of the School Department by the State of Maine has been recorded as revenue and an expenditure, which amounted to approximately 123,299.00.

NOTE M - TAX LIENS:

At a special town meeting, the Town voted to waive the foreclosure of certain tax lien mortgages on real estate for taxes assessed against a taxpayer. The amounts waived total 22,444.60 and are included in the total liens of 73,932.53 and 2014 real estate taxes of 187,284.48.

NOTE N - RISK MANAGEMENT:

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. All significant losses are covered by commercial insurance. There has been no significant reduction in insurance coverage. Settlement amounts have not exceeded insurance coverage for the current year or the three prior years.

NOTE O - OVERLAPPING DEBT:

The Town of Nobleboro is situated in Lincoln County and is therefore subject to annual assessment of its proportional share of County expenses. Long-term debt outstanding in Lincoln County, for which the Town of Nobleboro would be proportionally responsible in the event the County defaulted, amounted to 6,790,000.00 at December 31, 2014. The Town of Nobleboro's share would be 4.50% of the debt, or approximately 305,550.00.

NOTE P - LEASE:

On June 1, 2005 the Town entered into a fifteen (15) year lease with Deborah Wilson and Mark Becker for the use of property in the Mills section of Town. The Town receives annual rent of one dollar (1.00) for the use of the town landing property.

NOTE Q - SNOW REMOVAL:

On July 17, 2013 the Town entered into a five (5) year snow removal contract with Hagar Enterprises, Inc.
