The Town of Nobleboro saw some changes in 2022. At the beginning of the year, we hired Robyn Clark part time to fill our officer position. Susan Pinnetti-Isabel & Emerald Friend did an excellent job in keeping the office running smoothly. In December Susan resigned her position. We hired Michelle Cameron as Treasurer and Assistant to the Selectboard. We feel they will work together to provide the town a great office.

We continue to accept credit cards for payments on daily transactions.

We still offer Rapid Renewal for Motor Vehicle which allows you to re-register on-line. Rapid Renewal has been a positive convenience for our customers. You also have the capability through Inland Fishery and Wildlife to go on-line and re-register your ATVs, snowmobiles & boats as well as hunting and fishing licenses. The links to these are on the town's website.

In January 2023, the Town Office hours are as follows: Monday thru Thursday 8:00 am – 4:30 pm, closed Fridays.

We would like to give many thanks to all the committees that serve the town: the planning board, appeals board, and budget committee who have worked hard all year to help the town run smoothly.

We would also like to recognize and thank our Code Enforcement Officer Stanley Waltz and Tax Assessor Dennis (Frank) Reed. They continue to work hard for the town, putting in more hours as it has been a busy year. We appreciate their time and efforts in all they do.

Lincoln County ACO has been working with the town office to be sure all are complying. If you have any animal concerns and/or problems, please feel free to contact LC Animal Control at 563-3200 or 882-7332.

In May, we announced the Dow Scholarship & The Frances and Heather Key's Scholarship winners. The Committee awarded (2) \$2000.00 Dow Scholarships to Allison Mank & Bryce York. We also, announced (3) \$2000.00 Frances and Heather Key Scholarships to Patrick Miner, William Sherrill and Eliza Spear. We wish them all the best of luck in their education. George Dow was a great resource for the town and was always proud of "The Little Town with a Big Heart."

The Frances & Heather Key Scholarship is to assist Nobleboro students interested in pursuing an education beyond high school. Frances Key was a resident of Nobleboro since 1973 and was an active member of the community. Her daughter Heather is also honored in memory through this scholarship award.

Applications for both scholarships are available in the spring at the Nobleboro Town Office, the Town's website & at the guidance offices at the local schools. These applications are available for Nobleboro students only.

We would like to recognize Camp Kieve for their contribution to the Town in the amount of \$15,000. This is in lieu of the taxes because they are non-profit.

Many thanks go out to all the members of the Minnehata Fire Dept, Nobleboro Fire & Rescue Dept. Fire Chief Richard Genthner has done a great job in recruiting new members and keeping all members trained to keep the town safer. 2022 was big for them as they received a new fire truck. They also applied for and received a grant which helped purchase new air packs, a commercial washer & dryer and miscellaneous equipment.

The town is in good shape financially. We were able to keep the tax rate the same in 2022 as it was in 2021. The outlook is not the same in 2023. There will be an increase. We also had to borrow more for the fire truck, which is still for 10 years.

## Road Commissioner's Report

This has been a very busy year for us working on the town roads.

We started the spring of 2022 working to clear back bushes and tree limbs growing into the roadway on East Neck Road, Lower Cross Road, Morgan Hill Road and part of West Neck Road. We also have done a lot of ditching on the roadways to reduce storm water damage and water and ice buildup throughout the town.

We continue to replace worn out culverts and are working with our selectmen to replace a vital culvert at Cotton Stream on Bayview Street. This stream is also important for rainbow smelt spawning in the spring time. So it is necessary for us to implement this replacement with an engineered plan and a reputable contractor for proper installation. We currently have a 10 ton weight limit over this portion of the road and are working as quickly as possible to replace this culvert.

We have also conducted a full-town road survey rating the current condition of each town road in conjunction with the State of Maine Local Roads Center. This survey will be rated with computer software to help us determine how to address maintenance of our many miles of degrading roads in an unbiased and priority manner. This will be a helpful and useful tool to determine spending for our paving, repairs, and budgeting needs.

We repaired the washed out shoulder at the Oyster Creek section of Bayview Street by strengthening the guardrails and protecting the road from future damage. This project was done under DEP advisement and our town's Code Enforcement Officer supervision to ensure a safe and long-lasting repair to last many years. We are always grateful for the help and recommendations to achieve our goals for the betterment of our roads.

We are determined to bring you the most we can provide on your town roads for your safety and ease with travel, working within our town's budget.

It is my pleasure to be your Road Commissioner and thank you for this opportunity to serve our community.

## Code Officer/Plumbing Inspector

2022 was a busier year than the last few years. We issued fourteen (14) new building permits for new homes. We issued a total of 88 building permits for the year, which includes all other buildings, additions, and remodels.

Now is a good time to remind homeowners that if you are doing maintenance then you do not need a permit from the Town. HOWEVER, if the repair or maintenance is more than replacing decking or a window or door and the size or framing needs to be changed, then you DO need to get a permit.

Each property that gets a tax bill outside the Shoreland Zone is allowed one (1) outbuilding up to 150 square feet without a permit. All buildings in the Shoreland need a permit. Any new building needs to meet the setbacks required by ordinance. Any building located in the Shoreland Zone that gets replaced needs both a permit and meet the setbacks to the greatest practical extent. If you have any questions, please call the office and ask. I am in the office two days a week or by appointment.

All contractors that move dirt regardless of the amount must be certified by the State and have a certificate number that goes on the application.

The fines have been increased to start at \$1,000 for any violation and can go up from there. The fine will be a minimum of \$100 per day and the application is double or, if in the Shoreland, the fee is five times the permit fee.

Tree and brush cutting is limited in the Shoreland Zone. Only hazard or dead vegetation can be cut within 100 feet of the shoreline. No vegetation can be cut if it is under three feet high. If you are cutting or pruning inside the 100 feet you should call to have the Code department check it out. **All** work in the Shoreland needs to have *before* and *after* pictures taken. This is a state law and will be strictly enforced. All septic systems need a minimum of three inspections, one at the beginning, one after the devices are set, and the final after the grass is established. Mortgage companies are getting harder to deal with and costing the homeowner a lot of money to have an inspection performed by inspection companies.

# **2021 - 2022 Comprehensive Plan Update Adopted October 4, 2022**

## ***A VISION FOR NOBLEBORO'S FUTURE***

***Nobleboro is a “Little Town with A Big Heart” committed to maintaining its rural character; preserving its history; protecting its recreational and natural habitats, land and water resources; ensuring the quality of its students’ education; and enhancing the quality of life for all its citizens.***

***Further, we want our citizens to have the freedom to choose their work environment and feel comfortable aging in place, with opportunities for affordable housing, a safe and vibrant community environment and the benefit of modern technology.***

***We hope to preserve and improve upon the rural qualities we value while planning for future possibilities enabling our community members to live, work and grow together across their lifespan.***

A Town’s Comprehensive Plan is the guiding framework for future sustainable development, economic growth, public services, water, habitat and natural resource preservation. Over the last three years the members of the Nobleboro Comprehensive Plan Update Committee, established by the Nobleboro Select Board during the month of August 2019:

- ✓ held over sixty meetings;
- ✓ hosted a series of community conversations funded by a Lifelong Community Mini Grant from the Maine Community Foundation;
- ✓ conducted a Town wide Community Input Survey and;
- ✓ provided additional opportunities for Town officials and residents to participate in the update process.

This is the first time since 2007 that the Town of Nobleboro has updated its Comprehensive Plan.

The all-volunteer Nobleboro Comprehensive Plan Update Committee used a forward-thinking approach to its work with a goal of developing a revised plan that the committee felt was environmentally sound; where growth is sustainable; and good stewardship of our community’s history, culture and environmental resources are ensured. At the same time making sure that the revised plan keeps pace with our Region’s, State’s and Nation’s rapidly changing educational systems, technologies, infrastructures and climate without altering the rural character of our town was also priority.



The updated Plan offers recommendations based on input from numerous community members, stakeholders, municipal officers, Town staff, boards, committees and cultural, environmental, and economic entities in and around Nobleboro. The latest update to the Nobleboro Comprehensive Plan continues the Town's established long-range planning process and creates a framework for managing future development. Nobleboro's updated Comprehensive Plan and three Companion Volumes are large, in-depth documents setting goals based upon residents' vision for their community five, ten, or twenty years in the future. It takes into account the history of the community, current and past trends, and what residents want to see preserved, enhanced or changed. Elected and appointed officials need this information as guidance in executing their roles effectively. A Comprehensive Plan approved by the Town's residents can provide a great reference point for serving the public's interest and for receiving private grants and foundation funding for major projects.

The comprehensive planning process and the ultimate Plan it delivers are vital to a town's eligibility in applying for and potentially receiving various levels of County, State and Federal grants and funding allocations. The Plan is also designed to serve as a roadmap for future development and land use ordinance revisions in keeping with residents' desire to retain the Town's rural character. The final version of the Town of Nobleboro's 2021 – 2022 Comprehensive Plan and the three Companion Volumes were approved by the Nobleboro Select Board on June 29, 2022, found to be complete and consistent with the State of Maine's Growth Management Act on July 28, 2022 and adopted by the residents of Nobleboro at a Special Town Meeting held on October 4, 2023.

Nobleboro's revised Comprehensive Plan remains only a roadmap **UNTIL** the Town brings the vision into reality. It will take all stakeholders: Select Board; Planning and Appeals Boards; Code Enforcement Officer; Road Commissioner; Office Staff, Fire Department, Town Committee Members; and every citizen to help Nobleboro grow, while retaining the essential character of the Town. The Town's plans to ensure that actions are taken to address the revised Comprehensive Plan's recommended policies and strategies will need regular periodic oversight by all of the communities stakeholders.

A volunteer committee to assist the Town in implementing the plan is being formed. This committee, working with Town officials, will be encouraged to research issues and tasked with recommending strategies, policies and, when necessary, improved ordinances for the benefit of the Town and its citizens. The committee will support the goals and strategies of the Plan as recommended and adopted by the Town.

The Implementation Committee will, therefore, replace the Comprehensive Plan Update Committee, and be representative of all segments of Nobleboro’s population. Nobleboro residents please express your interest in becoming a member of the Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee by contacting the Town office.

## Broadband Committee

The Nobleboro Broadband Committee (NBBC) has been very busy during 2022. After receiving Select Board and citizen's approval at the March town meeting, we have leveraged the town's commitment of \$50,000 from the Town's American Rescue Plant Act (ARPA) for a potential of receiving over one million dollars in additional funding to expand broadband in Nobleboro. If the NBBC is successful with this grant application, residents throughout the town of Nobleboro will have access to broadband service of no less than 100/20 if desired, with minimal exceptions. It will also increase the percent of residents fiber optic broadband available, with 1GB/1GB potential and beyond, from 30% to 47%.

Since our August of 2021 inception, we've had some notable accomplishments:

- Mapping the entire community to determine the number of residents, businesses and public facilities served, underserved and unserved by acceptable broadband (high speed) connectivity (100/20)
- Conducted a community-wide survey with greater than 25% response
- Wrote and submitted grant applications, as applicable
- Improved public understanding of the need to bring reliable broadband connectivity to the entire community; hosted an information table at the Nobleboro Historical Society's 2022 Applefest
- Participated in an educational presentation with representatives from Lincoln County Regional Planning Commission and the Island Institute
- Held informational gatherings and discussions with our local internet service providers (ISP)
- Participated in numerous Zoom meetings with regional organizations and coalitions working on community, regional and statewide broadband initiatives

We will continue our pursuit of 100% access to broadband and creating digital equity for all. For more information, please visit the town office website and follow the links for the NBBC.

## Nobleboro Fire and Rescue

We would like to extend our gratitude and thanks to the residents of Nobleboro for their abundant support this year. We couldn't have done it without you.

We spent the last year chasing grant money to address aging equipment, out of service equipment, replacing broken equipment, and repairs on our apparatus. We also spent a good amount of time getting our new equipment from the AFG, King Grant and Leary Foundation grants in place and in service.

Since my last report we have put the following list of things in service in the past year:

- New MSA SCBAs funded by Assistance to FireFighters Grant
- New Arctic SCBA Fill Station funded by Assistance to Firefighters Grant
- Saber Gear Dryer funded by Leary Foundation
- Milnor Gear Washer funded by Leary Foundation
- New engine funded by Nobleboro Residents and Minnehata Fire Company

We were fortunate to be awarded \$185,000 from the Assistance FireFighters Grant from FEMA for new SCBA packs and SCBA fill stations. The Minnehata Fire Company, which is the firemen's association, is contributing \$19,020 toward the new fire engine purchase. These funds were to upgrade the onboard generator and put a light tower on the engine. We are working with our grant writer to attempt to get more grant funding in the coming months.

In 2022, the department received the Maine Bureau of Labor's SHAPE award, which was presented to the fire department this fall by Commissioner Laura Fortman who is a Nobleboro resident. With this award, we became one of 40 fire departments that has completed the compliance work needed for this award.

In 2022, we ran more calls than the previous year. We saw an increase of large burn permits being issued. We also issued more burn permits than ever before, issuing 13 hand-written permits, and three long-term commercial permits. Online we issued 232 permits using the State of Maine.

Our call run breaks down as follows:

Fire: 15 calls

EMS: 150 calls

Hazardous Conditions: 24 calls

Service Calls (Water issues, public assistance, etc.): 27 calls

Good Intent Calls (Smoke odor, canceled en route, etc.): 5 calls

False Alarm & False Calls: 12 calls

Severe Weather & Natural Disaster: 2 calls

Special Incident Types: 1 call

There were a total of 245 calls for the year. We gave mutual aid support to neighboring towns 15 times, and received mutual aid 12 times this past year. We have been able to be more accurate with our recordkeeping than in the past years.

The department was lucky enough this year to receive great support from the community via the Firemen's Association "Minnehata Fire Company" and they purchased upgrades for the new fire engine and much more. Without this support from this dedicated group of volunteers we couldn't have met the needs of the department and its ever evolving mission.

In 2022 our members of the department continued to work extremely hard to change the face of the department and the minds of the Nobleboro community and surrounding. We have worked hard and will continue to work hard for you. While we have only had 13 members on our roster, we haven't had any lapse in services provided to the town.

We had to repair a bunch of things this year but not as much as the years past. We continued the repairs on the main fire engine until our new engine was put in service in November.

The selectmen chose to use APRA funds to replace the doors on the main station at the town office. This has helped a lot with heating of the station in the month of December. We have noticed that the station stays warmer with the thermostat at 58 degrees for the bay area of the station. Also, thanks to Ken York's loving donation of an air conditioning unit for the officers' office we were able to work through the summer on the paperwork.

In the coming year, I will again ask the Selectmen's established committee to look into our buildings and the repairs to make a safe, energy-efficient space for the members of the town and the department. Our Mills Station is still in need of repair to make it usable and safe. We need to address major rot in the building, drainage issues, etc. We also need to address the issue with our station in Glendon where the town office is. We have issues with insulation, windows, and water that comes in on every storm. There's a lot of work ahead of us, but together as a community we can do it.

We are looking forward to serving this wonderful community and having the department grow and meet our needs along with our ever changing mission.

## **Minnehata Fire Company**

For those of you who may not know, the Minnehata Fire Company is a charitable organization which supports the mission of Nobleboro Fire and Rescue as well as the citizens of the town. We are a registered 501(c)(3) charity and all donations made to Minnehata are tax deductible. Minnehata Fire Company is a separate entity from Nobleboro Fire and Rescue.

Money raised by Minnehata goes toward fulfilling any budget shortfalls when equipment is needed for the department. Last year the association spent approximately \$23,000 to add a light tower to the new engine. The light tower is an essential piece of equipment, as it is able to light up any emergency scene, increasing visibility and safety. Additionally, Minnehata provides temporary relief to community members who have been affected by fire or other emergency. This year we were able to aid two families on short notice with this fund. Finally, Minnehata conducts an annual toy drive for Nobleboro families in need. In 2022 we helped five families with a total of 12 children.

Minnehata raises money via an annual donation letter sent to all addresses in Nobleboro, an annual pork BBQ and multiple fund raising cookouts at Duck Puddle Campground. During all these events, community members make donations of money and supplies and goods which contribute greatly to our success. Minnehata Fire Company members are not paid for these events and members have invested hundreds of hours in these endeavors with 100% of the money raised being put back into the fire department and the community.

The Mills fire station is owned by Minnehata Fire Company and is in bad need of improvements. With the delivery of the new Engine 22, the older Engine 1 is now stationed in the Mills and the southwest portion of town now has a reliable engine for coverage. Currently, the rear of the building has water running onto it, causing rot. Minnehata invested approximately \$30,000 in repairs five years ago, but until the run-off from the water damage is mitigated, it is difficult to justify additional repairs. Minnehata is currently working with a civil engineer firm as well as local excavators to determine the best course of action moving forward.



We would like to once again thank all the generous members of our community for their generosity. Paul and Meredith Blakesley of Duck Puddle Campground have been amazing, providing us a space to operate cookout fundraisers; Joanne Kroll of the Village Store who helps provide us with food for these events; Karen Kelly at Ginger Mousse who is always there for us with pastries and dinners for trainings; and finally Spear Farms who once again generously donated all the corn for the annual BBQ. There are too many people and organizations to list, but know that each donation is greatly appreciated and always put to good use.

## Nobleboro K – 12 Education

The Central Lincoln County School System (CLCSS), operating as an Alternative Organizational Structure (AOS 93) serves seven towns: Bremen, Bristol, Damariscotta, Jefferson, Newcastle, Nobleboro, and South Bristol. AOS 93 brings together five elementary schools: Bristol Consolidated, Jefferson Village, Nobleboro Central, South Bristol and Great Salt Bay. Approximately 1,040 students attend PreK to eighth grade in their communities own school district within AOS 93.

AOS 93 is guided by a mission statement with the common purpose of providing high quality learning for all CLCSS students. This system creates a network to implement common curriculum, assessment and instruction aligned with important learning standards that supports all students achieving to high levels.

### **Alignment with our Vision**

*AOS 93 elementary schools work diligently to provide an innovative learning environment that prepares all of our students for challenges beyond grade eight.* AOS 93 does not operate a high school; each AOS 93 town pays the approved state tuition rate to a local public or private high school. The majority of our students attend school locally and a small percentage attend schools with boarding options. In order to receive these public funds schools must meet criterias for instruction and complete an approval process with the State of Maine. During the 2022-2023 school year there were approximately 540 students attending area public high schools, private academies or equivalency programs.

*We strive to teach our students to be good people and do what's right for their neighbors, near and far.* Building social and emotional skills has become a priority in our schools as we see increased behavioral needs from our students after a lack of social interaction during the pandemic. Each AOS 93 school has adopted initiatives to support social and emotional growth for students. Teachers support student learning by offering a positive environment for all grade levels. Every staff member contributes to the learning of the students and all staff members are responsible for all students. Staff are diligent in addressing problem student behavior and, as often as possible, acknowledging and commending desired student behavior. Time and effort to train our staff in multiple methods for responses to behaviors continues to be a priority.

*Our interest in promoting health and resiliency for our staff and students has extended beyond the pandemic.* We continue to follow healthy practices to prevent and mitigate the spread of viruses in our schools. AOS 93 follows the communicable disease protocols as part of normal operations. We continue to maintain cleaning protocols and air filtration protocols to keep our schools safe. Water testing for lead and PFAS has been completed in each of our schools this year and results have been followed up with needed corrections to ensure the safety of the drinking water in each school building.

*A continuous safe and supportive learning environment is nurtured for our staff and students.* We have implemented updated emergency response protocols and considered upgrades to facilities and staffing to promote school safety in each of our schools this year. Our collaborative efforts with local safety agencies proved effective when tested this year. Every year schools have mandatory training for all staff on the topic of safety. We are grateful for the support of the Damariscotta Police Department and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department who provided training for staff this fall to reinforce our preventative strategies and build our capacity to respond to safety incidents.

### **Meeting Emerging Needs**

AOS 93 schools have been diligently recruiting and retaining staff in regular and special education. Our dedicated building administrators worked through the summer to hire many new staff for different roles in our elementary schools. Recruited staff were then supported at our New Teacher Academy event, at which staff were presented with a variety of activities and presentations to welcome and support them.

During the summer, intervention efforts for our students who have lost learning during the pandemic continue with a full-day summer school program. Each school partners with CLC YMCA to provide students with targeted academics as well as outdoor, experiential learning opportunities.

### **Planning Forward**

Each school has a Comprehensive Needs Assessment Planning Team working in collaboration with the principal to complete the annual needs assessment, analyzing data to identify emerging academic and behavioral needs. The findings of these teams will be presented to the individual Boards and shared with the staff. The intent is to use collected data to identify goals and more purposefully leverage local, state, and federal funding to target those areas.

A Curriculum Planning Team with teacher members representing each school was recruited to focus on what works and what support is needed. Professional development in all aspects of writing instruction is being planned for this spring. A Math Review is planned to take a close look at both of our math programs to consider how current instruction aligns with best practices, to revisit research-based reviews, and to analyze the math data we have gathered. The results of our review will shape our math curriculum plans moving forward.

**Nobleboro Central School** has focused on school climate and developing efficient behavior and academic MTSS processes this year. New to AOS 93 after four years as the instructional administrator at St. George School, Adam Bullard was hired to lead NCS. NCS has enhanced the CAL program and looks to continue to build social and emotional skills for its students. One of this year's highlights is a collaborative activity in which students have built toboggans and raced them. Efforts to expand the community collaboration in CAL will continue.

The vibrancy of our local communities and their support for our AOS 93 schools is essential for the attainment of student aspirations. Our common mission of providing high quality learning for all AOS 93 students continues. Together we make a positive difference in the lives of our students, local families, and the communities in which we live and work. We are increasingly coming together to create a network to implement common curriculum, assessment and instruction aligned with important learning standards that supports all students achieving to high levels.

# Nobleboro Central School

**NCS is dedicated to creating and supporting a challenging, respectful, and safe learning environment where the uniqueness of each individual is honored.**

To the residents of Nobleboro, it is an honor to submit my first annual report as the principal at Nobleboro Central School.

To begin, I'd like to welcome several new staff members who joined me this year. Eddie Farrell remains on staff, but has transitioned into the 6th grade teaching position and joins Luke Suttmeier, 7th/8th grade Teacher, on the middle level team. Shania Madden is our new Guidance Counselor. At the lower elementary level, Kristyn Wiles takes on the 2nd grade and Alison Kelsey-Bryant helms an additional 1st grade classroom. Tammy Meserve and Olivia Parlin add to our team of fantastic Educational Technicians. Keeping the school running smoothly and efficiently, Robyn Henny takes over reins as our new full-time Administrative Assistant. Long-time Administrative Assistant, Nancy Courville, has thankfully remained on board in a part-time role to help ease the transition for Robyn and me.

We are currently serving 146 students in grades K-8. That number fluctuates throughout the year as families move in and out of the community. Generally, however, that has been the enrollment for several years. In addition to these K-8 students, Nobleboro has nearly 80 high school students. The majority of these students attend Lincoln Academy, our nearest high school of choice.

Nobleboro's focus continues to be providing the highest quality educational experience. This is evident in each classroom where teachers work tirelessly to meet the academic and social-emotional needs of students by providing a rigorous curriculum, using engaging instructional practices, and continually measuring growth. Joining our mission is a wide range of local community organizations who are equally devoted to the growth of our students: Hearty Roots, Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust, the CLC YMCA, and Kieve just to name a few. There are few days when these partners are absent from the building.

Beyond our traditional classroom experience, NCS also hosts the Center for Alternative Learning. CAL is a regional program supported financially by Nobleboro and the other sending schools in the AOS that works to provide a personalized alternative learning experience for students in grades 6-8. Also available to Nobleboro students in need of behavioral special education or life skills programming is the Compass Program at Bristol Consolidated School and Pathways Program at Jefferson Village School respectively. Both of these programs are regional as well and are supported by all of the sending schools.

Our physical plant remains a safe and secure building that is maintained vigilantly. Our goal is to ensure that it will stand as a community resource to be proud of for decades to come.

The past year at NCS has been marked by the welcomed return of many traditions and experiences that have kept the school at the heart of the Nobleboro community. Activities such as the ice cream social for kindergarten through 4th grade families to kick off the school year, 3rd grade Senior Buddies, "Dining with (Lincoln County) Deputies," NCS Open House, Applefest and many other special events have brought people in the community back into the building.

We look forward to another year of educating Nobleboro students and the community-building activities that honor their potential.

## Central Lincoln County Adult & Community Education

Although this past year saw us able to impact more lives than the previous one, it was nonetheless a challenge to remain vigilant in regard to COVID-19 protocols and guidance. Each time we thought we were finally out of the woods in regard to this pandemic, we would find ourselves back in the forest and looking for the way out. Yet despite all of the challenges, we managed to graduate six students between the ages of 17-28 who are now on a much brighter path to their futures. Our graduation was held on June 7th at the Lincoln Theater and was a truly inspiring event. One of our graduates from last year, Honora Boothby, made the moment especially touching with her hauntingly beautiful rendition of “Meadow Lark” from the musical *The Baker’s Wife*. From the processional to the flipping of the tassels once diplomas were in hand, it was a moving and magical night!

Since 2018 your local adult education program has served 65 students from our seven AOS93 communities in our high school equivalency program and successfully graduated 36 of them! Additionally, 89 people accessed our College Transitions program for support in finding the right post-secondary school, in getting into the trades, in accessing workforce training, in completing financial forms, or simply figuring out what career might be best given one’s interests and strengths. And finally, this past year we graduated another 17 students in our CNA partnership program with LincolnHealth!

Since 2018, we have registered 1,070 residents of our AOS93 towns for one or more of our in-person or on-line enrichment classes! From learning sign language to making cheese to getting into the right Medicare program, we here at Central Lincoln County Adult & Community Education have your back! We partner with all of the adult education programs from Topsham to Belfast as well as LincolnHealth, the YMCA, the National Digital Equity Center, the Maine Tasting Center, Central Maine Community College, the Academy of Medical Professions, and the Learning Resources network to provide you with a wide range of learning options - both career-wise and just-for-fun wise. We may be a very small program but through these partnerships we are able to offer a host of new opportunities for both our educational and enrichment clients. Many of these new offerings are able to be accessed remotely which is especially beneficial during these still uncertain times.

Finally, for the first time in many years, your local adult and community education program is seeking an increase in financial support from each of our AOS93 communities. Both of our federal grants are ending this year and, as you know, the price of almost everything has increased significantly over the past few years. In order for us to continue helping people reach their educational and workforce goals, we need to increase our towns' contributions to something closer to what other adult education programs receive from their local communities. Out of the ten adult education programs in our regional HUB (HUB #7), the local contributions range from 60.56% (Camden/Rockport) to 78.69% (Boothbay Harbor). Our Central Lincoln County program receives only 33.60% in local contributions from our AOS93 towns. Clearly, we lag behind our adult education counterparts by a significant amount when it comes to local funding. Thankfully, donations from the Burns Family Foundation have enabled us to keep our doors open throughout this pandemic. However, we need to have a more stable and predictable source of income moving forward. I sincerely hope you will vote to support us when it is time to cast your ballot/raise your hand at the annual Town Meeting.

We are beyond grateful to our AOS93 communities for all of the support we have received over the years and hope it will continue. We are your *Learning for Work & Life* team and we are here to help make dreams come true!

## Lincoln Academy

To the Residents of Nobleboro:

Thank you for your continuing support of Lincoln Academy, an independent school serving students from midcoast towns since our founding in 1801. The school is thriving thanks to our supportive community, vibrant and diverse student body, and hardworking faculty and staff. After more than two years of pandemic adjustments, we are back to a full schedule of academics and extracurricular programming in the 2022-23 school year.

**Here is a quick “by the numbers” look at Lincoln Academy in the 2022-2023 academic year:**

Current Enrollment: 582 Students from 20 Towns and 15 Countries

- 35% of LA students qualified for free & reduced lunch
- 21% of current juniors and seniors attend vocational programming at BRCTC
- 20% of LA students take one or more AP classes during their years at LA
- 33% of LA students play at least one sport
- 23% participate in band, choir, and/or theater programs

Enrollment: 2022-23 school year enrollment has been strong thanks to large ninth and tenth grade classes. Next year’s incoming class so far looks smaller than the graduating class, but we anticipate total enrollment to remain consistent. The residential program continues to grow, and we expect to have over 50 international and domestic students in the dorm next year.

Academics: Lincoln Academy offers 135 classes, including 42 STEM classes, 30 Performing and Visual Arts classes, 30 Advanced Placement (AP) and honors classes, and 11 vocational certificate programs through the Bath Regional Career and Technical Center (BRCTC).

Athletics: In 2022 LA sports teams found significant success: The girls tennis team won their third State title in four seasons. The boys soccer team and both boys and girls cross country teams won KVAC championships, the girls cross country for the second year in a row. Many individual athletes also won accolades and broke school records in wrestling (one new state champion!), swim, golf, and track and field.

Performing Arts: While performing arts programs were particularly hard-hit by pandemic restrictions, LA’s award winning programs have bounced back this year. The theater program staged seven sold-out performances of *Les Miserables* in the fall, and 14 musicians (including band, choir, jazz, and orchestra) qualified for All-State music festivals and 29 qualified for District Honors music festivals.

Of the 125 graduates in the class of 2022:

- 62 enrolled in 4-year colleges
- 21 enrolled in 2-year colleges
- 37 entered the workforce
- 5 entered the military

Two members of the class were National Merit Semifinalists and 17 were AP Scholars. Graduates were awarded over \$350,000 in scholarships through Lincoln Academy, local, statewide, and national foundations.

Faculty Credentials

- 57% of Lincoln Academy faculty have their Master’s or other advanced degree
- 5 faculty members have gone beyond their state certification to become National Teacher Certified Teachers

Career Preparation

- The First Annual Peter J. Benner Job Fair in spring 2022 hosted 19 local businesses with immediate openings for employment. Some students were hired on the spot! The second annual Job Fair is planned for April 5, 2023.
- A new weekly Career Exploration Series is currently underway, bringing professionals to campus to meet with students and discuss a wide variety of career paths.
- The online Jobs Board connected dozens of students and recent graduates with summer and year-round jobs at local businesses and organizations.

## **Nobleboro/Jefferson Transfer Facility**

The Transfer Station, operated by Nobleboro and Jefferson, and under contract with Bremen, Damariscotta, and Newcastle, provides for the disposal of most types of solid waste generated in the five towns. In 2022 our household waste, construction, demolition, and bulky waste all went to Waste Management in Norridgewock, ME. We use the services of Lincoln County Recycling to recycle cardboard, newspaper, plastic and many other products. We also recycle our universal hazard waste (televisions, computer, fluorescent light bulbs, mercury switches and rechargeable batteries)

2022 saw a lot of changes in our staff. Brandon Achorn and Glenn Daiute left us in the fall. Thank you both for all your service. We hired John Arsenault as our new manager of the facility. We then hired Howard Griffin and Shawn Wilkie as full-time attendants. Along with Kevin Nunes they work hard to keep things running smoothly. With all the changes we were able to keep things running without problems. We hope your trip to the Transfer Station continues to be a positive experience.

I would like to thank everyone who takes the time to recycle. This effort really helps us save money in the long run. We do have programs for recycling paint, food waste, metals, electronics, paper, and cardboard. In 2022, we had a hazardous waste day for people to get rid of there hazardous chemical and other hazardous materials. We hope to do the same again this year. We will be advertising for this so be watching for it.

The outlook for 2023 is that we hope to continue our efforts to recycle whenever we can. The attendants are more than willing to help you recycle. Everything you recycle helps reduce the amount it costs to put items in the mainstream trash.

We are looking to keep things the same in 2023. We try to be efficient as possible to save taxpayers money. Thank you for you cooperation with the staff. They enjoy working with you.

The Transfer Station is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. The front gate is closed at 3:50 p.m. each night to allow time to close out the computer. We are closed on Sunday and Monday. This allows our staff to have two days off in a row.

We will continue to review our operations in effort to provide good service and the most efficient Transfer Station possible. We are interested in your comments and recommendations and will attempt to incorporate them whenever possible.

## Great Salt Bay Sanitary District

Great Salt Bay Sanitary District (GSBSD) is a publicly owned, quasi-municipal utility organized to provide safe drinking water in Damariscotta and Newcastle, and to provide wastewater treatment services in the Towns of Damariscotta, Newcastle, and Nobleboro. The District currently has 1428 water customers and 713 wastewater users. Scott Abbotoni is the Water Division Manager and LeeAnna Libby is the Wastewater Division Manager.

Our mission is to provide safe drinking water, adequate fire protection and effective wastewater treatment. The District is committed to public health, customer service and environmental protection.

The Drinking Water Division's water supply is "Little Pond" a pristine 77-acre spring fed pond with an ultraviolet light water treatment system as a primary disinfectant and Sodium Hypochlorite as a secondary disinfectant.

The Welton Tank on Standpipe Road in Damariscotta and the Academy Hill Tank in Newcastle feed the Twin Villages water for fire suppression and quality drinking water.

The Water Division is trying to get Federal Infrastructure money to replace some aging water lines. We would like to replace lines on Glidden, Pump, and Cross Streets in Newcastle, and a line that runs through the woods from Welton Tower on Standpipe Road, to Route 1 by Hammond Lumber in Damariscotta. This will help with water quality and increased fire flows throughout the water system.

The Wastewater Division's treatment facility for Damariscotta and Newcastle consists of three aerated lagoons with a capacity of eight million gallons.

- In 2012 the lagoons were cleaned; aeration system was upgraded and the lagoon liners were inspected.
- 2016 an upgrade was done to the Plant's Office, electrical and lagoon blower system.
- 2018 an equipment storage garage was erected at the Main Plant.
- 2021 the District connected to a new collection line put in by the town of Damariscotta. The eight-inch line runs through the waterfront parking lot connecting to new service lines that run to the businesses.

The Damariscotta Mills area of Newcastle and Nobleboro has a small sand filter. The sand filter is fed by septic tanks which are maintained on a three-year rotation, by the District.

The Great Salt Bay Sanitary District's operations are carried out by five full-time employees and are overseen by an elected six-member Board of Trustees. Representing Damariscotta are William Brewer, John Gallagher, and Lewis Cameron. Newcastle Trustees are Alan Ray and Louis Rector, and representing Nobleboro is Robert Whear. The Trustees meet the second Wednesday of each month at 5 p.m. The District office is located at 121 Piper Mill Road in Damariscotta. The public is encouraged to attend.

## Midcoast Conservancy

The mission of Midcoast Conservancy is to protect and restore vital lands and waters on a scale that matters, in partnership with the communities we serve, throughout the Midcoast Maine region through conservation, restoration, outdoor recreation and learning. Our service area comprises 24 towns, three watersheds and over 14,000 acres of conserved land which include 55 preserves and over 95 miles of trails.

In 2022, we completed a scientific analysis to prioritize efforts for our 30x30 Land and Water Conservation Initiative to conserve 30,000 acres of the midcoast area by 2030. Doubling our current conservation efforts will contribute significantly to protecting and restoring the vital lands and waters of the midcoast, act to mitigate the impacts of climate change, and ensure the quality of life our residents and communities deserve.

In Nobleboro this year, Midcoast Conservancy worked to do the following:

- Protected 153 acres of Land Protected as part of the McNeill conservation easement
- Completed three Youth Conservation Corps projects for Damariscotta Lake homeowners
- Monitored and addressed cyanobacteria outbreaks on Damariscotta Lake
- Built and opened the Roland S. Barth Welcome Center at nearby Hidden Valley Nature Center

## Coastal Rivers

Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust is your community land trust, caring for the lands and waters of the Damariscotta-Pemaquid region. Coastal Rivers has active programs in **land conservation, water quality, trails and public access, and nature education.**

For the benefit of all Nobleboro residents, in 2022 we provided:

- **Public access to trails, open space, and shoreline** on Coastal Rivers' many nature preserves. We maintain over 51 miles of hiking trails for low impact use, including the universally accessible Rhoda and Leon Cohen River Trail in Damariscotta. Studies show that spending time in nature can reduce stress, lower blood pressure, and boost energy and mood, among other benefits. We invite you to find trails to explore at [coastalrivers.org](http://coastalrivers.org).
- **Strategic land conservation** with the goal of protecting water quality, providing places for wildlife to thrive, and building climate resilience. In Nobleboro this includes holding four conservation easements, or voluntary landowner agreements, totaling just over 100 acres.
- **The Courtesy Boat Inspection (CBI) program** at the Pemaquid Pond boat landing, which seeks to keep aquatic invasive plants out of our lakes and ponds. Invasive plants can have a devastating impact on water quality, recreation, and property values. As part of the CBI program, Coastal Rivers interns talk to Pemaquid Pond boaters about invasive plants and, with permission, look over boats and trailers for any sign of invasive plants before they are launched.
- **Water quality monitoring**, in partnership with Lake Stewards of Maine. Volunteers check for changes in water quality in Pemaquid Pond that might lead to algal blooms or other conditions that could have an effect on wildlife habitat, recreational opportunities, or property values. Monitoring occurs monthly through the summer.
- **Monitoring for cyanobacteria**, in collaboration with Bigelow Laboratory for Ocean Sciences. Fortunately, no toxic cyanobacteria were detected in Pemaquid Pond or connected waterbodies.

- **The LakeSmart Program**, which offers free, individualized technical advice and information to lake and pond-side homeowners about best property care and management practices to prevent erosion and safeguard water quality. To learn more or to take advantage of this service, please contact Sarah Gladu at [sgladu@coastalrivers.org](mailto:sgladu@coastalrivers.org).
- **Coastal Rivers nature education programs** that connect people of all ages with nature. We are pleased to provide teacher support and outdoor education classes **free of charge to AOS 93 schools**.

In 2022, our work with Nobleboro Central School included:

- o Providing technical and teaching support to teachers and students who are creating and developing ways to use a trail on school property
- o The Wabanaki Education program for grades 3 and 7 at Coastal Rivers Salt Bay Farm
- o A program on Maine Mammals with grade 3
- o An orienteering program for grade 6
- o Hands-on, outdoor education programs for students in the Center for Alternative Learning program, taking place twice a month throughout the school year

Throughout the year, we offer in-person guided hikes and family programs that are open to the public and free of charge. We also host online workshops, trainings, and discussions on a variety of topics. Find our calendar of events and programs at [coastalrivers.org/events](http://coastalrivers.org/events). - **Technical support.** At the invitation of the town, Coastal Rivers and Midcoast Conservancy partnered to work with the Town of Nobleboro on a revised comprehensive plan to ensure protection of local natural resources.
- **Information and resources**, including boating and fishing regulations, boating safety materials, lead tackle exchange, and loon habitat information.
- In collaboration with **Maine Audubon's Loon Count**, volunteers participated in the annual loon count on all our local fresh-water ponds and lakes. Coastal Rivers hosted the volunteer breakfast where the data sheets were collected and volunteers regaled each other with stories of sightings and observations about local loons.

Formerly Damariscotta River Association and Pemaquid Watershed Association, Coastal Rivers is a nationally accredited land trust. Our accreditation was renewed in 2020 after rigorous peer review. This distinction signifies we meet the highest standards of financial management, ethical conduct, responsible government, and lasting stewardship.

## Skidompha Library

2021 and 2022 began Skidompha's climb out of the pandemic service model. Nobleboro's financial support has helped this transition and enabled us to hire new staff, continue to expand our programming, and make necessary improvements to the facility. Nobleboro's contribution remains critical to maintaining the level of services we provide, and I am thankful to the Town for its ongoing confidence in Skidompha and its work in the community.

Skidompha hired two new key personnel over fiscal year 21-22, a new Teen Librarian, Kristi Favaloro, and a new Adult Services Librarian, Molly Coyle. Both librarians have surpassed our expectations. Each fearlessly leaned into their new respective positions bringing energy and creativity to everything they did. Early sign up for our 2022 Summer Read surpassed any previous year of my tenure at Skidompha, and both teens and adults showed great enthusiasm. Both librarians reached and forged new professional relations and created new services to entertain, educate, and support the community - including a free pantry offering health foods and fresh vegetables, as well as personal hygiene items.

Skidompha also applied for and won a number of significant grants that brought needed funds to the library. These funds enabled us to improve health and safety by refurbishing and modernizing our heating, ventilation, and air conditioning system. This work significantly increased the air filtration and turnover within the library. We also won support to maintain our Hoopla downloadable library subscription and fund new programming targeting adults, teens, and young children. Our teen room was remodeled and our in-house EPOCH teen magazine published two new volumes.

In addition, we maintained our regular programming of weekly drop-in tech help, Chats for Champions, Poetry, Mindfulness Meditation, Children's Story Time, and our monthly book club. We also continued to provide our bread-and-butter reader services, access to two downloadable ebook collections, and our critical clerical services of open public WiFi, printing, faxing, scanning, and copying. And as ever, we continued our commitment to being a source of compassionate human connection to our patrons.

Skidompha is rising. Over the fiscal year of 2020-2021, 21,800 people entered the library. In fiscal year 2021-2022 that figure rose to 36,000. I fully expect 2022-2023 will substantially exceed these numbers. Skidompha will continue to rise through the generosity of our community and supporting municipalities, and through the passion and energy of its staff.

My third full year as Executive Director, while challenging, was profoundly fulfilling, and I am both proud and privileged to work with such extraordinary people as the Skidompha Library staff. Their work makes Skidompha the bright, vibrant, and necessary resource it is.

## Central Lincoln County Ambulance

Residents of Nobleboro,

The Central Lincoln County Ambulance Service responded to 2,322 calls in 2022, with 1,685 being emergency calls for service. I am incredibly proud of the dedicated EMS providers at CLC Ambulances and the Nobleboro First Responders. They all continue to provide compassionate and quality medical care while displaying admirable dedication as they keep up with the increasing educational requirements to maintain their EMS licenses.

CLC Ambulance has continued to utilize grant opportunities to help acquire essential equipment without burdening the taxpayer. Through a successful grant process, we have funded a fourth new LUCAS Automated CPR device. This acquisition has equipped all four of our ambulances with these life-saving devices. This new equipment makes response to cardiac arrest patients more efficient and safer. These devices aid our EMS caregivers in continuing to provide the best medical care to our community.

We have also continued to provide Community Paramedicine visits to members of our community for our eighth straight year. This program provides services to patients in their homes that include: at-home blood draws, medical assessments, wound care, medication reconciliation, education, and some point-of-care lab tests. The program runs through a referral from your primary care physician or a physician you may see in the Miles ER. The program has positively impacted many patients' ability to manage medical conditions at home. Please contact your primary care physician for more information if you or someone you know may benefit from these services.

As many know, the workforce within Emergency Medical Services has been shrinking in the last few years. There have been two local EMS courses in the last year to aid in remedying this problem, but still, more providers are needed. There are several ways an EMS provider can serve their community full-time, part-time, or volunteer. If you are interested in helping your community and becoming an EMT, Paramedic, or First Responder, please contact our organization, or your local fire department. ## Lincoln County Television

Lincoln County Television (LCTV) begins its 34<sup>th</sup> year as the local community media station, with thanks to the Nobleboro community for financially supporting your station and for your continuing support.

Even as in-person gatherings resumed this year, LCTV continues to be our community's central resource for citizen access to municipal meetings, community events, public health updates, sports, and cultural offerings.

We have expanded how we deliver local, fast, and trustworthy information to Lincoln County citizens with upgraded equipment and services, a new full-time staff member, and new shows for broadcast and online viewing. We continue to offer technology advising to Lincoln County municipalities to help them upgrade and optimize their remote meeting equipment for more robust citizen access.

In 2022, we broadcast and archived 158 municipal meetings from all over Lincoln County. We offered citizens regular updates with LincolnHealth experts, to keep our community up to date with trustworthy information. At the request of town officials, cable subscribers in South Bristol joined the LCTV viewing community on local channel 7.

For 2022 original programming, we doubled the number of original shows over 2021, including 50 weekly Wuzzup News Shows; 49 Chamber Chats featuring local businesses across all of Lincoln County; 27 essential Community Conversations with host Marva Nesbit; 25 Wiscasset Speedway shows; 9 Talkin' Town Talks that brought you people and places you should know more about; 6 What's Happening at the CLC-YMCA shows; 8 specials showcasing the Wiscasset Schoonerfest, Damariscotta Pumpkinfest, Boothbay Harbor Tuna Challenge, Windjammer Days, and Lobster Boat Races; historical society presentations; a live-streamed Candidates Forum for Maine Senate and House races; dozens of high school basketball games; local church services; and an online bulletin board for community non-profits.

In 2022, we continued broadcasts of our live-streamed high school basketball games on channel 7, for viewers who prefer to watch on their televisions rather than a computer. And for times when our local high school sports teams play at the same time, we offered multiple *LCTV.org* live streams simultaneously.

We continued to grow our connections to the community with new partnerships, expanded sponsorships from local businesses, and a greater number of people receiving our weekly newsletter and social media posts. We were honored to receive a 2022 Paul Harris Community Service Award from the Damariscotta-Newcastle Rotary.

LCTV finished 2022 with a record-setting solid year of accomplishments, service to our communities, and increased capabilities. We are very grateful to our Board of Directors and to all the towns, businesses, and individuals who help us thrive.

We look forward to 2023 with solid plans and direction from our Board to deliver more quality programming for Lincoln County people, to connect more meaningfully to our broadcast and online viewers, and to strengthen community partnerships.

## Nobleboro-Newcastle Fish Agent

The alewife run in Damariscotta Mills started during the first week of May and didn't let up until the second week of June. The run was a huge success, both in terms of the number of fish passing into Damariscotta Lake to spawn and in terms of the harvest. Specifically, 1,103,346 alewives passed up the fish ladder enroute to their spawning grounds in Damariscotta Lake. Additionally, 1,588 trays of alewives - more than 95 tons of fish - were harvested for lobster bait, bringing in a total of \$95,415. The fact that we were able to harvest this many fish while passing over one million fish into the lake strongly demonstrates that the Damariscotta Mills alewife run has recovered fully from the depleted stocks prior to the fish ladder restoration.

We again sold our alewives to independent lobstermen, the South Bristol Fishermen's Cooperative, halibut fishermen, and even folks determined to express their culinary creativity by cooking a few fresh alewives. We also provided alewives to Jesse and Jake Oliver, who stepped up to help out their grandmother, Mary Jane Buchan, and her sister, Sally Mulligan, continue the tradition of smoked Alewives at Mulligans Smokehouse in Damariscotta Mills.

The big construction project this year was the replacement of the screens located in the Middle Stream above the dippers. The screens are a critical component of the fish run. Most importantly, they keep the alewives from trying to ascend the Middle Stream, which is too steep for fish passage. During the harvest, the screens serve as a fence line that the fish follow towards the dippers. The steel frame for the dippers had been slowly rusting but the need for replacement accelerated when a log came over the falls and did significant damage to the entire screen frame structure.

The new screen assembly included structural improvements to the frame as well as openings in the center of each screen panel to improve the passage of runbacks (alewives returning to sea after spawning). Runbacks often return down the Middle Stream and they must pass through the screens. Previously, two of the screen panels had openings with chutes and now all six panels have openings with chutes, giving us far greater flexibility for moving alewives back downstream safely through the harvesting area.

Replacing the foot bridge that spans the fish ladder will hopefully be accomplished in 2023. This project is the combined effort of the Fishladder Restoration Group and the towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle. The new design has been engineered by Gartley and Dorsky Engineering and Surveying, with construction planned for the summer of 2023. There are also plans to repair walls and weirs in several fish ladder pools.

Thanks again this year to harvesters Kurt Oehme, J.B. Smith, Jim Brinkler, Richard Powell, Leigh Morrell, and Tom Curtis for all their efforts, which made for another successful harvest season. Kurt and Leigh are busy with the fish ladder and its infrastructure year round, for which I am thankful. As usual, a number of folks continue to pitch in behind the scenes. Thank you to Deb Wilson for leading tours, dealing with the media, and being an advocate for alewives as a member of the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission; to Ken Ames and Bob Barkalow for their help installing the steel framework for the screens; to Laurel Ames and David Bridges with their continuing fundraising efforts; and to Charlie Huntington, who volunteered his time to paint the new steel frame and screens.

This diverse group of citizens from all over Lincoln County is currently assisting me with policy review and our ongoing process of accreditation thru the Maine Law Enforcement Accreditation Program sponsored by the Maine Chiefs of Police Association. If you are interested in serving on this committee or learning more about just what they are doing, please reach out to me at any time.

In 2022, we began to formally track the number of mental health related calls for service. The Sheriff's Office works closely with the National Alliance on Mental Illness and we strive to enhance relationships with other community mental health providers to find ways to relieve some of the reliance on law enforcement responding to those having a mental health crisis.

In 2022, this data revealed 177 calls for service that averaged 43 minutes each time. 48 percent of the time, Deputies were able to stabilize the situation based on their own training or with the assistance of community based crisis services. Over 70 percent of these calls were investigated by Deputies with specialized crisis intervention training. Less than 3 percent of these calls resulted in injury to either the Deputy or the person in crisis. The ability to de-escalate situations and reduce the risk of injury to all involved is why I am committed to having all my staff trained in Crisis Intervention.

This data did show that almost 55 percent of these calls involved individuals who had previously been involved with a mental health call. Surprisingly, over 10 percent of the time these calls involved individuals that we had responded to assist 10 or more times.

Because of this data, I am committed in 2023 to finding more opportunities to “co-respond” with community mental health providers in hopes of putting in place services to reduce the amount of mental health calls involving the same individual.

## U.S. Senator

Dear Friends,

A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

Article 33 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to spend an amount not to exceed 3/12 of the budget amount in each category of the 2023 Annual budget during the period of January 1, 2024, to the 2024 annual town meeting.

Article 34 Shall the Town vote to appropriate the following account with the combined sum of \$896,000 to be applied to reduce the 2023-year Tax Rate?

Article 35 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and proper, and cause execution of quit claim deeds for the same If the property is to be sold except that the Municipal Officers shall use the special sale process required by 36 MRSA § 943-C for qualifying homestead property if they choose to sell it to anyone other than the former owner(s).
