Fish Ladder Restoration Committee

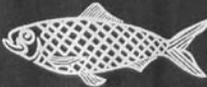

Selectmen's Report

The Town of Nobleboro had another interesting and challenging year in 2015, beginning with a positive and unremarkable audit report from our outside auditors. Our Treasurer, Mary Ellen Anderson, had our books ready for the audit in the first week of January as usual; and we are always pleased to start the New Year confident of our financial status.

This year the Budget Committee completed their work right on schedule, giving careful consideration to all sections of our fiscal planning for 2015. Working with the Selectmen, the Fire Department and the School Committee, they produced a proposed budget that was subsequently adopted at our town meeting in March without controversy. The Selectmen wish to thank the Budget Committee, along with all of the other volunteer boards and committees who work diligently throughout the year to accomplish the town's business. These individuals make a significant contribution to our town through their efforts in support of public safety, conservation, our school, planned development, recreation and so many other areas. We wish to recognize them for making Nobleboro a better place in which to live.

In relation to our town meeting, the Selectmen wish to thank everyone who participated in the discussion and voting last March. We depend on Town Meeting to provide us with guidance for the coming year, and we hope to see many of you on March 19, 2016 at 10:00 a.m. at the Nobleboro Central School.

The Selectmen again wish to use this opportunity to acknowledge the staff who makes our town office run so well, serving the public daily and helping the Selectmen do their jobs.

This year's biggest challenge was capturing all of Mary Ellen's knowledge and passing it to Susan Pinnetti-Isabel. Mary Ellen Anderson, who is our office manager, tax collector, treasurer, town clerk and registrar, has announced her retirement as of May 31, 2016 after working 33 years in our town office. Susan Pinnetti-Isabel, our Deputy to all these positions, is learning all the jobs to make it a smooth transition. We want to also welcome Jodee Kelly as our new assistant clerk. Many thanks to these ladies for all they do to keep the office running smoothly and for the help they give the Selectmen. We also would like to recognize the work of our Code Enforcement Officer Stanley Waltz, our Tax Assessor Frank Reed, and our Animal Control Officer Kyle Emerson.

In May the Dow Scholarship Committee awarded a \$1000.00 scholarship to Nancy Billings. We wish her the best of luck in her education. George Dow was a great resource for the Town and was always proud of “The Little Town with a Big Heart”. Applications for this scholarship and for the Francis and Heather Key Scholarship (both for Nobleboro students only) can be picked up each spring at the Nobleboro Town Office or from your guidance office at your local school.

As always, many thanks go out to all the members of the Minnehata Fire Department. They are always looking for more members to help them in responding to the approximately 150 fire and EMS calls each year. Anyone interested should stop by the Fire Department on Monday nights, which is their regular meeting and training session.

The town has a number of properties that classify as non-profits. We want to, once again, recognize Camp Kieve, a non-profit, for giving the town a \$15,000 donation this year in lieu of taxes. We hope that other non-profits might follow their example to support the town with the many services we provide.

The town of Nobleboro is in good shape financially and we closely follow the advice of our auditor. One positive development in 2015 was the town saw an increase of \$45,260 in excise tax. In addition our carry forward was \$497,000.

In 2015 the town was awarded a FEMA grant to install a permanent generator at the Fire Station-Town Office. Our share of the cost will be voted on at the March Town Meeting.

Don't forget to vote on Friday, March 18th from 12:00 noon to 6:00 p.m. at the Town Office meeting room and we hope to see you at Town Meeting on March 19th at 10:00 a.m. at the Nobleboro Central School.

The time has come for me to retire as your Town Clerk, Treasurer and Tax Collector. My official date of retirement will be May 31, 2016. I never dreamed, when I accepted these three positions, that I would stay for some 33+ years. The time has gone by so quickly with so many changes. Not to mention that I've had a couple of name changes myself. I hope when future generations look into our town records, they don't say, "Who was that Mary Ellen woman anyway?" The town has been gracious to me and my family over the years and I appreciate all that has been given to me.

Over the years I have had the pleasure of working with 16 different Selectmen in 14 different combinations of Boards of Selectmen. I've seen the town grow from town transactions being done at individual homes to the Town Office we have today. I've been here for the addition of a Park & Ride Lot on U.S. Highway 1, the construction of a boat ramp on Muscongus Bay, the closing of the town dump and the building of a Transfer Station, a Bicentennial celebration, a new addition to the Nobleboro Central School, two municipal computer installations, two revaluations of town properties, two constructions of Sand/Salt sheds, the building of a boat ramp on Pemaquid Lake, the construction of a ball field, the fish ladder restoration project, the completion of a Comprehensive Plan, a 911 street numbering for the entire town plus numerous Ordinances enacted and amended.

We have gone from counting ballots by hand, way into the "wee" hours of the morning to completing elections within an hour after the polls close. We've gone from hand writing checks to pay bills to having the computer print the checks for us. We've gone from only having office hours for a few hours a day to being open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday. We've gone from a one-person office to an office employing three people. Each of these changes was made to better serve the community of Nobleboro, "a small town with a big heart."

Those of you who have known about my upcoming retirement have asked "What are you going to do?" and "What will you miss most?" I'll answer by simply saying "I'm going to spend some time doing the things that all the vacationers do when they come to Maine. The State of Maine is a beautiful state and I'm going to explore it more now that I'll have the time. For thirty-three years I've lived my life by the Municipal calendar and it will be nice to wake up in the morning and say "What am I going to do

today?” What I’m going to miss most is the contact I have with my citizens, while serving them at the Town Office.

To each and every one of you I want to say ‘Thank you’ for letting me serve as your Town Clerk, Tax Collector and Treasurer for all these years. I think the record of 33 years of service in these positions will be mine for a longtime.

Code Officer Report

The number of permits is off six from last year's 90 permits. There was an increase for new house permits. We had 10 new house permits this year with 8 of them coming in after August. There was an increase in plumbing permits but a decrease in septic replacement systems.

The State has been holding classes for contractors for the past five years and has implemented a certificate process for the disturbance of more than 1 cubic yard of material in the Shoreland Zone. Any work within 250 feet of any shore needs to be done by a certified contractor. Starting 1/1/16 if a contractor is not certified and is found working within the Shoreland Zone area, they will incur a hefty fine. The certification is for landscapers, woodsmen, builders and dirt contractors. As a homeowner, it is also your responsibility to obtain any required permits and to ask to see the contractor's certificate.

In 2015 there was a record number of seven groups who came to the Center for one of the “Life in Olde Nobleboro” classes including: Mrs. Cindy Sabina’s 6th graders, Ms. Tamara Kaler’s 5th graders, Ms. Paula Schuster’s 3rd graders, Ms. Avis Ingalls’ 2nd graders, and Mrs. Robyn Henry’s 1st graders. The Miles of Friends came with their 3rd grade partners for a special tour and Carolyn also prepared a program for a Nobleboro Cub Scout group. Carolyn works with the teachers to ensure that the programs fulfill the class’ curriculum requirements. The programs included learning about Captain Hopkins, a Nobleboro sea captain, and tracing his 11 world-wide sea ventures. Closer to home, students used the old hand-crank washing machine, wrote with quill pens, shelled dry corn, made butter, learned about local Native Americans and created mortise & tenon joints. There are lots of smiles and we get wonderful thank you letters from each class.

In October our 10th AppleFest revival was enjoyed by over 500 folks, and NHS successfully raised enough funds for the Society’s scholarships and other community activities. We thank all the volunteers who helped

Adult and Community Education

CLC Adult and Community Education again provided services to over 800 adults in 2015. We offered the HiSET high school completion program, assisted adults in preparing for college, worked with literacy students, provided medical certificate programs and served up a wide variety of enrichment classes for young and old.

We provide basic literacy services along with high school completion classes free of charge in our Learning Center program on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Monday and Tuesday mornings. Free College Transitions courses are offered through The Lincoln County College Connection (TLC³) – a cooperative program with 3 other Lincoln County Adult Education programs. Dozens of adults from Lincoln County participated in classes that will help them prepare for college through that program.

In 2014-15 we had 6 students complete a high school credential and another 25 worked towards a high school diploma or on basic language and math skills. Anyone 17 or older who is out of school and wants to earn a high school credential or who needs to improve their reading, writing or English language skills should contact us to get started.

We continue to work with Lincoln County Healthcare to provide vocational training in several medical programs. In 2014-15 we conducted 3 Certified Nursing Assistant courses with 21 students completing the program and receiving certification and employment. We were also able to offer 7 CPR, CRMA and PSS classes with 33 people receiving certification.

Hundreds of students continue to enjoy the more than 120 low-cost, high impact courses offered in Community Education. This fall we combined our brochure with the RSU40 Adult Ed brochure to further expand our classroom choices and to provide a single point of information for classes throughout Lincoln County.

Winter 2016 School Report for Sending Towns

Lincoln Academy is an independent secondary school chartered in 1801 to serve the midcoast area. It offers a comprehensive program, including courses at all levels in the areas of English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, World Languages, Fine and Performing Arts, Technology Education, Physical Education, and Health. Regional Vocational, Alternative Education, and Special Education programs are available. On a ten-year cycle Lincoln Academy is accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC), and was most recently reaccredited in 2015.

In 2015 three new facilities opened on the Lincoln Academy Campus. The Cable-Burns Applied Technology and Engineering Center (ATEC) now offers 10,000 square feet of classroom space for engineering, science, art, and technology courses. The new dormitory houses 57 of the 84 residential students currently attending Lincoln Academy. The William A. Clark Athletic Field is an artificial turf field where the soccer, field hockey, and lacrosse teams now play.

Governance

Lincoln Academy is governed by an independent Board of Trustees. Officers include: Ann McFarland '73, President; Christine Wajer '85, Vice-President; Dennis Prior '91, Secretary; Sarah Maurer, Treasurer. Members include: Faustine Reny '01, Robert Baldwin '62, Stephen Dixon, Lisa Masters '83, Jon McKane, Karen Moran, William Morgner, Rob Nelson, Tim Alley '77, Pam Gormley, Marcus Hutchins, and Hugh Riddleberger. David Sturdevant is Head of School.

The Student Body

Lincoln Academy has a current enrollment of 587 students in the 2015-16 school year. The majority of students come from 16 local towns. 84 residential students come from 16 countries around the world. After 4 consecutive years of growth, the Residential population has met available housing capacity and for the foreseeable future will remain between 80 and 90 students.

Graduates

Of the 109 graduates in the Class of 2015, 80 enrolled in post-secondary education; 70 enrolled in 4-year colleges/universities, 10 enrolled in programs shorter than 4-year (2-year and certificate programs), 24 are employed/seeking employment, and 5 enlisted in military service.

Curriculum

Lincoln Academy remains committed to its comprehensive curriculum as we strive to meet the needs of all our students. We have added new courses this year, including engineering, metal sculpture, AP Chemistry, and BC Calculus. The new courses take advantage of the space and tools in the ATEC building, as well as serve our increasingly diverse population of both day and residential students.

Finances

Unlike most independent schools, The Board does not set day tuition. Because most students' tuition is paid by their sending towns, the tuition is established by the State Department of Education using a formula based on average per pupil expenditures of Maine public high schools during the previous two years. The tuition for the 2015-16 school year was increased by 3.9% from the prior year to \$10,131.00 per pupil. The Insured Value (IV) factor is an amount in addition to tuition intended to fund capital maintenance and debt service. The legislated IV factor amount of 10% was reduced in 2009 to 5% and remained at 5% through last year. The legislature voted to partially restore the IV by voting to increase the amount to 6% of the calculated tuition figure for 2014-15. The 6% rate was carried over into 2015-16 and is \$607.86 per pupil for this year. While towns are allowed to continue to pay the full 10% and some of our area towns have done that in the past, this year all towns have elected to pay at the 6% rate.

Supporting Lincoln

While the sending towns do pay tuition for each student, that amount is calculated each year by the state. The tuition allowance is simply not enough to provide the quality educational experience that Lincoln Academy promises each and every student. LA depends on support from the Lincoln Fund (the Annual Fund) to fund the deficit, but the gap is widening between the cost of operating the school and incoming tuition revenues. Private contributions have allowed Lincoln to support both programs and capital improvements. Money raised through the Lincoln Fund supports students and faculty, and is vital to the life of the school. Since 1997, over \$1.4M has been contributed to general operations, over \$650K for specific programs, and about \$10M for capital projects. Contributions to annual and capital campaigns provide for the perpetuation of and improvements to LA's programs and physical plant without increasing local taxes.

Nobleboro/Jefferson Transfer Facility

The Transfer Station, operated by Nobleboro and Jefferson, and under contract with Bremen, Damariscotta and Newcastle, provides for the disposal of most types of solid waste generated in the five towns. This year our household waste went to PERC in Orrington. The construction and demolition bulky materials are hauled to a landfill in Norridgewock. We use the services of Lincoln County Recycling to recycle cardboard, newspaper, plastic and many other products. We also recycle our universal hazard waste (televisions, computers, fluorescent light bulbs, mercury switches and rechargeable batteries).

You will see the Transfer Station Attendants out helping the customers with their trash and recyclables. They work very hard to keep the facility neat and safe. Our hopes are that they make your trip to the Transfer Station a positive experience. The Town would like to give many thanks to our three employees: Barry Howell, Brandon Achorn and Linwood Rideout for all they do for the Transfer Station.

In 2015, we resurfaced the entrance road to our facility as it was starting to break-up. We also did a lot of minor repairs to meet the labor and safety board requirements.

This year we had a major hauler stop bringing in their trash to our facility. This change saved us some money in hauling fees and the price of getting rid of the trash. The towns will see this savings which will be reflected in our budget request for 2016. There is going to be a 6.73% decrease to all five towns.

We increased our recyclables by 80 tons this year. This is very important because it saved the towns close to \$90 per ton. This increase is due to the efforts of the public and our staff in educating what can actually be recycled.

The Transfer Station is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. The front gate is closed at 3:50 p.m. each night to allow time to close out the computer. We are closed on Sunday and Monday. This allows our staff to have two days off in a row.

We will continue to review our operations in an effort to provide good service and the most efficient Transfer Station possible. We are interested in your comments and recommendations and will attempt to incorporate them whenever possible.

Great Salt Bay Sanitary District

Great Salt Bay Sanitary District (GSBSD) is a publicly owned, quasi-municipal utility organized to provide safe drinking water in Damariscotta and Newcastle, and to provide wastewater treatment services in the Towns of Damariscotta, Newcastle, and Nobleboro. The District currently has 713 water customers and 1428 wastewater users. Scott Abbotoni is the Water Manager, overseeing all water operations and LeeAnna Libby is the Wastewater Manager overseeing all wastewater operations.

Our mission is to provide safe drinking water, adequate fire protection, and effective wastewater treatment. The District is committed to public health, customer service, and environmental protection.

The Drinking Water Division's water supply is "Little Pond" a pristine, 77-acre spring fed pond with, an ultraviolet light water treatment system, as a primary disinfectant and chlorine as a secondary disinfectant.

The Welton Tank on Standpipe Rd. in Damariscotta and the Academy Hill Tank in Newcastle feed the Twin Villages.

In 2015 the Water Division replaced 1400 feet of aging A.C. Pipe that had had multiple leaks with new 12 inch H.D.P.E. pipe therefore eliminating a problem area. During the process the District also replaced old fire hydrants with new ones. As not to excavate the High Street School Street intersection in the future the district made provisions for possible expansion down the remainder of School Street by installing valves and extending the Main out of the intersection.

The Wastewater Division's wastewater treatment for Damariscotta and Newcastle consists of three aerated lagoons with a capacity of eight million gallons.

The lagoons were cleaned, the aeration system was upgraded and the lagoon liners were inspected in 2012.

In 2015 we began an upgrade to the main plant's electrical and blower system they will be finished in 2016.

The Damariscotta Mills area of Newcastle and Nobleboro has a small sand filter, fed by septic tanks, which are maintained by the district.

The Great Salt Bay Sanitary District's operations are carried out by five full-time employees overseen by an elected six-member Board of Trustees. Representing Damariscotta, are William Brewer, John Gallagher, and Raymond McConnell, representing Newcastle are Christopher Hayden

and Alan Ray, and representing Nobleboro is Robert Whear. The Trustees meet the second Wednesday each month, 5 p.m. at the District office, located at 121 Piper Mill Road, Damariscotta. The public is encouraged to attend. Office hours are; Monday – Friday 7:00 a.m. -3:00 p.m., for more information, please contact our Water Division at 563-3010, or our Wastewater Division at 563-5105.

Midcoast Conservancy

Midcoast Conservancy is a land trust formed from the merger of: Damariscotta Lake Watershed Association, Hidden Valley Nature Center, Sheepscot Valley Conservation Association, and Sheepscot Wellspring Land Alliance. We are continuing the good work of those organizations and building on their strong community ties. Our mission is to support and promote healthy lands, waters, wildlife, and people in the Midcoast through conservation, education, and recreation. Serving much of Waldo and Lincoln County, Midcoast Conservancy cares for Damariscotta Lake and provides over 60 miles of publicly accessible trails, more than 75 annual programs designed to help people of all ages deepen their curiosity of the natural world, and 6300 acres of conserved land open to the public for non-motorized recreation.

In 2015, Midcoast Conservancy cared for Damariscotta Lake and its surroundings by:

- Continuing to reduce invasive plant Hydrilla (the most aggressive in North America) populations in Davis Stream and Cranberry Cove, both in Jefferson. In 2015, no Hydrilla was found in weekly surveys at Davis Stream; only 20 plants were found and removed during bi-monthly surveys at Cranberry Cove. DLWA staff and trained volunteers conducted surveys for all invasive plants on over 50% of Damariscotta Lake's shoreline. We will continue being a leader in the fight against invasive plants in 2016.

- Conducting regular testing of Damariscotta Lake water quality. Dissolved oxygen and clarity tests indicate water quality is "stable." However, annual testing of harmful phosphorus shows the lake is at risk of algae blooms, especially in the South Arm. High levels of fecal coliform were also identified at the Damariscotta Mills swimming area on the Nobleboro/Newcastle town line. In 2016, we plan to add testing for fecal coliform/E-coli in select public swimming areas to protect human health and safety. When levels exceed Maine water quality standards for bacteria, we will notify the community and public officials.

We are excited to continue to work with you to protect the land and water in Nobleboro, and to provide opportunities for everyone to get outside to enjoy the beautiful place we call home.

- Implementing the Courtesy Boat Inspection program to educate boaters about invasive plants and minimize the risk of undesirable plants getting into the ponds.
- Facilitating “PWA Ponders” gatherings, which are annual public get-togethers to share concerns and updates about conservation efforts related to the ponds.
- Funding the Maine Apprentice Gardener (MAG) program at Great Salt Bay School. The goal of the MAG Curriculum is to connect young people with the natural world and with the source of their food. The MAG program is a project of PWA and The University of Maine Cooperative Extension, in collaboration with FARMS (Focus on Agriculture in Rural Maine Schools) and AOS 93.

Central Lincoln County Ambulance

Hello:

I would like to take this opportunity to share what our service has been up to in the last year. We experienced our busiest year ever. We have responded to a total of 3,097 calls for help. To date we have responded to 146 emergency calls in the Town of Nobleboro, and 17 community paramedicine (free non-emergent house calls).

In addition to our regular responding, we have been busy with continuing education and updating our response protocols. With the help of the Miles LincolnHealth we have implemented a new protocol when responding to a person with stroke-like symptoms. We are utilizing our iPad tele-medicine program to have a real time face-to-face doctor consult on our way to the emergency room. Once the doctor has evaluated the patient, the determination to report directly to the CAT scan imaging machine is made. If it is in the affirmative, we, the EMS crew and patient, go directly to the testing area on arrival and assist with the diagnostic test. This saves 20 to 40 minutes of precious time in determining the next steps of treatment. Since implementing this we have already seen several positive outcomes from the expedited stroke evaluation protocol.

I am pleased to be able to share that we have just ordered a new ambulance. We are scheduled to take delivery in June of 2016. The new box style ambulance will be replacing a 2002 model year van ambulance. The vehicle with no equipment has a sale price of \$122,328.00.

Also due in part to the Maine Energy Grant Fund we were able to replace all of our building light fixtures with new L.E.D. lights. This includes our outside wall and pole lights. Since the changeover we have seen an average decrease in our electricity bill of about \$130.00 per month!

I would like to thank the Fire Department, and First Responders of Nobleboro as well as the Town residents for all of your continued support.

LCTV was fortunate to have two summer interns, *Sammy Zaidi* and *Kyle Livingston*. Sammy helped develop our new website (coming online in 2016) and Kyle helped repair and update our computer hardware.

After retiring for the second and last (we hope!) time, *Dave Svens* moved back to Bristol (Chamberlain). Dave has an extensive background in television production and gives generously of his time and talent to LCTV, local producers and the Town of Bristol. Dave produced a video of the Seacoast Community Orchestra concert held at the Lincoln Theater with the help of camera crew *Tam Green* and *Athena Taylor*.

LCTV purchased three High Definition cameras. At the current time, Time Warner Cable TV and Tidewater IPTV only send out our video in Standard Definition, but LCTV does upload the High Definition version to LCTV's Video on Demand webpage: www.lctv.org/vod.html.

Nobleboro-Newcastle Fish Agent

This past spring we harvested 770 bushels of alewives to sell for lobster bait and 12 bushels more for widow orders. We were able to harvest only 11 days this year, as the fish were slow in coming in, and we were dealing with low water levels. For reasons known only to themselves, the alewives arrived most days in small, separate schools instead of the large congested groups that lead to a good harvest. Thus, this pattern resulted in a successful run of fish up to the lake, while the harvesting was a little slow. We continued to sell any excess alewives to the South Bristol Coop because it worked out so well in 2014.

As usual there was lots to do in the harvesting area. We replaced the conveyor belt and worked out a new system to get water into the overhead pipe that transports the fish to the loading area. We also had a chute manufactured that was a great help in our effort to prevent the entrapment of runbacks. In the spring of 2016, we will begin the permitting required to replace the concrete walkway between the check office and the harvest area. In addition, we will patch the dippers and rebuild the conveyor box.

The success of the fish ladder hasn't changed the fact that there are still lots of annual chores to do before, during, and after the alewife run. In fact, something needs to get done there all year round. Deb Wilson, Kurt Omhe, and Leigh Morrill deserve our thanks for all they do, things would be very different at the fish stream without those three. Thanks also to the harvest crew, Jim Brinkler, Kurt Omhe, and JB Smith. Eben Wilson pitches in when he can, as do several of the other lobstermen who come to buy bait every year, something that we appreciate very much.

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration – 2015

The fish ladder restoration was nearly complete at the start of the 2015 upstream alewife run. Importantly, all of the pools had complete interiors and were working well. The fish were slow to come in, however, likely the result of the especially cold and snowy winter of 2014-2015. The first fish arrived to be counted May 8 and the final count for the year was on June 20.

Once in the fish ladder, alewives moved up well in every pool and we were soon seeing good counts. In all, 689,664 alewives made the ascent– a good count but less than that of 2014 (1, 066,314 fish). The lower number likely reflects a combination of the cold, late spring coupled with the poor run four years before. Alewives return to spawn after four years at sea and, in 2011, only 63,036 alewives completed the ascent to spawn in the lake (a result of the concrete pool walls in the middle section of the ladder that year).

There is still more work to be done to fully complete the fish ladder restoration so fundraising continued, albeit at a slower pace. The Fish Ladder Restoration Festival, held on Memorial Day weekend, was a great success and donations and small grants continued to be made throughout the summer and fall to help with upcoming work.

In the fall of 2015, the Jorgensen crews returned to work on the top of the fish ladder. The uppermost pool was re-built and concrete was pumped under the pool to help stop the large leaks that have been getting worse in the past few years. To that end, the back wall of pools two and three was also completely re-built and two walls in the Williams' backyard were repaired.

We can now look forward to completing the stone veneer on upper wall sections, carrying out smaller repairs to keep the fish ladder in tip top shape, and taking on the next task: re-building the walkway between the fish house and the harvesting area. The fish ladder restoration has been incredibly successful and this year we received recognition at the annual meeting of the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission. Our amazing community has saved the fish ladder and it now looks and works better than it ever did in the past. Sincere thanks to one and all!

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration – A Review 2007 - 2014 Nobleboro/Newcastle Alewife Report - 2007

Greetings! My first year as fish agent has been a very eventful one. The season started with the annual spring clean up of the fish ladder and pools by removing debris and fallen rocks to achieve the best unrestricted water flow possible.

We had a good fish run this year. We harvested almost 800 bushels of fish and passed more than 80,000 fish into the lake. The return run of juveniles in the fall was also a success. Thousands of small alewives descended the ladder to reach the river and salt water on their way out to sea.

Despite the good fish run, we have found that the fish ladder is in dire need of repair. A committee has been formed to undertake the formidable task of raising in excess of \$200,000 over the next three to five years. The committee consists of Deb Wilson, Mark Becker, Jim Brinkler and myself. I wish to thank them for all their countless hours spent at the fish stream and at meetings.

Restoration of the fish ladder started last fall with Will Poore and his



crew rebuilding the first section of wall. A special thanks to the Lundgrens for their financial support for that part of the wall. Another thank you goes to Hagar Enterprises for their donation of money and offer of labor and equipment and to DLWA, Ridgewood Power, and many individuals for generous donations. We have a lot of fund raisers planned for the next year and hope you can join us at one of these events.

Besides work on the fish ladder, the fish house received some attention this year. Thanks to DRA and Ken York, Inc. The storage building has been shored up and a new roof installed.

I have saved the biggest thanks to last. Frank Waltz has dedicated a lifetime to the passage of fish and to the care of the alewives harvesting operations. He is passing his knowledge on to a new group of caretakers, and to this we are most grateful.

If you have never seen the “Alewife Run” you owe it to yourself and your family to witness this awesome event of nature.

Restoration of the Fish Ladder at Damariscotta Mills - 2008

The fish ladder in Damariscotta Mills, built by Nobleboro and Newcastle in 1807, has been deteriorating for many years. In 2007, the Towns committed to a major, multi-year restoration in order to provide better passage for alewives and to increase the number of fish getting into Damariscotta Lake to spawn. Alewives still come to the ladder in great numbers but the numbers are fewer than in the past.

This year, Fish Ladder Engineers from the US Fish and Wildlife Service and fisheries biologists from the Maine Department of Marine Resources provided design services and technical support to the project. Their plans re-worked the upper end of the ladder into a series of resting pools separated by weirs that each raises the water level ten inches. In contrast to the original fish ladder, which followed the ground surface, the new configuration will provide the fish with a gradual ascent that will result in greater numbers of fish reaching the lake to spawn.

Specific work this year focused on the top part of the ladder, from the bottom of Russ and Diana Williams' backyard to the uppermost pool at the entrance to the Mill Pond. By year end, the east wall was completely re-built and work on the uppermost pools was almost complete. All of the pools in the Williams' backyard were partially complete and work is continuing



during the winter of 2009 so that the ladder will be ready for the alewife run next spring. Mason Will Poore of Boothbay is again carrying out the work.

During 2008, \$82,193.44 was spent on the fish ladder restoration. The Towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle each contributed \$7,500 from monies received from harvesting alewives. Other funding came from three grants totaling \$26,000, donations from Ridgewood Power Management, the Damariscotta Lake Watershed Association, the Nobleboro Historical Society, private donations, and through community fund-raising efforts. Nearly \$30,000 was raised in these events, which included a bean supper in March, a three-day Fish Ladder Restoration Festival in May, and a one-day Fish Ladder Restoration Celebration in October.

Restoration of the Damariscotta Mills fish ladder is truly a community enterprise. Many, many individuals and organizations have contributed time, talent, and funding to help make the first two years of the restoration possible. With deepest gratitude, thanks to all who have helped!! We have more work to accomplish but, with such community spirit, we can bring this worthwhile project to completion.

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration - 2009

Restoration of the Damariscotta Mills fish ladder continued in 2009. The winter was snowy and cold but mason Will Poore and his assistant worked through some really difficult conditions to get the ambitious top section of the ladder ready for alewives in May.

As spring approached, it became evident that all the necessary pools would not be ready if each pool was completed in stone. So, McClintick Foundations formed and poured the walls of four pools, which had concrete walls through the spring run. In the fall, the masons returned and veneered the walls with stone so that the upper section of the ladder, encompassing the length of Russ and Diana Williams' backyard to the opening at the Mill Pond, is complete.

In addition to the formal restoration work, much of the ladder was modified in the spring using the principles employed in the new ladder sections – resting pools separated by weirs rather than resting pools and runs. Poole Brothers donated 100 sand bags to help with this operation and a crew of volunteers completed the work.

Nearly 400,000 alewives were counted entering Damariscotta Lake in 2009, in contrast to 150,000 in 2008. There is no doubt that the restoration and modifications to the ladder had an impressive effect on the ability of



alewives to reach the lake to spawn. The number of alewives reaching the lake in 2009 was higher than any year since official counting began in 1987.

During 2009, \$106,378 was spent on the fish ladder restoration. The Towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle each contributed \$6,000 from monies received from harvesting alewives. Other funding came from grants, a donation of \$8,000 from Ridgewood Power Management, numerous private donations, and through community fund-raising efforts. Approximately \$40,000 was raised in these events, which included a bean supper in March, a three-day Fish Ladder Restoration Festival in May, a one-day Fish Ladder Restoration Celebration in October, and a \$10,000 raffle held in collaboration with the Nobleboro Historical Society.

The success of the fish ladder restoration is a result of the commitment, time, and energy of many community members and organizations. The restoration is now about one-third complete and we hope to be finished in another three years. With deepest gratitude, thanks to all who have helped! We are making a real difference for alewives and our community that will last for many years to come.

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration - 2010

Restoration of the Damariscotta Mills fish ladder continued in 2010 with the completion of the upper section and the partial completion of twenty-two pools in the upper middle of the fish ladder.

In the spring before the alewife run, the upper section of the ladder was completed. The weirs were adjusted for optimal fish passage and several pools were modified based on their performance in 2009. Finally, the walls of four pools which had been formed in concrete to save time in 2009 were veneered with stones so that they now look like the original fish ladder.

In the late fall, work commenced on the upper middle of the fish ladder, located behind the top two houses on Ladds Hill Road. This section was always a challenge for the fish, with steep runs, small resting pools, and much ledge.

The entire section of ladder was cleared out completely by Dale Wright so that new pools could be laid out. In all, twenty-two new pools were established, each changing in elevation by 10 inches. Concrete footings and pool walls were formed and poured in concrete by McClintick Foundations. The walls of these pools will eventually be veneered with old stones from the original fish ladder but, for now, the fish will have an easier passage.

In addition to the formal restoration work, the old fish ladder was again modified using the principles employed in the new ladder sections—resting pools separated by weirs rather than resting pools and runs. Poole Brothers and Damariscotta Hardware donated sand bags to help with this operation and a crew of volunteers completed the work.

Approximately 300,000 alewives were counted entering Damariscotta Lake in 2010 in contrast to 150,000 in 2008 and 400,000 in 2009. The new, upper section of the ladder worked exceedingly well but fish got hung up in the lower pools when many alewives came in at once and oxygen levels in the water became depleted, thus lowering the overall count.

In 2010, \$76,283 was spent on the fish ladder restoration. The Towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle each contributed \$8,000 from monies received from harvesting alewives. Other funding came from grants, a donation of \$5,000 from Krueger Energy, numerous private donations, and through community fund-raising efforts. Approximately \$35,000 was raised in these events, which included a bean supper in March, a three-day Fish Ladder Restoration Festival in May, and a one day Fish Ladder Restoration Celebration in October.

The success of the fish ladder restoration is a result of the commitment, time, and energy of many community members and organizations. The restoration is now nearly one-half complete and we hope to be finished in another three years. With deepest gratitude, thanks to all who have helped!! We are making a real difference for alewives and our community that will last for many years to come.

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration - 2011

The Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration had another successful year in 2011. Work continued on the twenty-two new pools in the middle section of the fish ladder and modifications were again made to the lower ladder to facilitate fish movements before that area can be restored. The work is a collaboration of the Towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle and the Nobleboro Historical Society.



Winter work on the pools, 2011-2012

In the spring of 2011 before the upstream alewife run, the weir elevations of all new concrete pools were adjusted and the new section was connected to the pools above and below it. In addition, some of the worst pools in the lower ladder were adjusted by mortaring rocks into place rather than by using sand bags. A crew from Jorgensen Construction of Bath, well-versed in setting stones in aquatic settings, did the masonry work at a reasonable rate to the towns.

A number of factors combined for a confusing upstream alewife run in 2011, resulting in low run numbers. Fewer alewives were noted along the entire Maine Coast except in a few locations, notably the Kennebec and Penobscot Rivers where several dams had been removed. Weather patterns were generally not as conducive to the run as in some years. And, we believe that the new concrete pools had a negative impact. Water fell steeply over the weirs between pools and up-welled against the opposite walls, confusing the fish. The concrete was fresh and many pools were deep, all factors requiring an adjustment by the fish.

The response of the alewives to the concrete pools made for an easy decision to stone-face the twenty-two new pools during the winter of 2011-2012. The work, again carried out by Jorgensen Construction, began in late November once the downstream migration of juvenile alewives was complete and will continue until smelt spawning time in April, 2012.



Spring 2012

Fundraising for the restoration was very successful in 2011. In all, \$98,183.76 was raised. Major contributors include the Edward A. Meyers Conservation Fund, the Davis Conservation Trust, Lise Aubry, the friends and family of Melissa Laser, and Krueger Energy. Substantial additional funds were raised through individual contributions and community fundraising events. Approximately \$35,000 was raised in these events, which included a bean supper in March, a three-day Fish Ladder Restoration Festival in May, and a one day Fish Ladder Restoration Celebration in October. A total of \$65,998 was spent on the restoration in 2011; the balance of funds raised will be used in 2012.

At a time when alewives (members of the river herring family) are being considered for listing on the Endangered Species List, the Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration has become a model for community-sponsored resource stewardship. Everyone who has helped, in whatever way, should be very proud of their efforts. We, as a community, will preserve our historic fish ladder and the alewives and other fish that rely on it for passage between fresh and salt water. Thanks to one and all!

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration – 2012

What a year at the fish ladder! During the winter and spring, the Jorgensen crew completed the interior stonework on the 23 pools that form the middle section of the fish ladder. The weirs between pools were also completed, making for nicely sloped openings with a nine to ten inch drop over 30 inches of length. More work was also completed on the lower, unrestored part of the fish ladder, again making that section more efficient.

The hard work paid off with a banner alewife run! A total of 517,044 alewives passed up the ladder and into Damariscotta Lake to spawn between late April and early June. That is the most fish to pass since official record-keeping began in 1987. Some of the 10 minutes counts were over 500 fish.

During the late fall, work began on upper 11 pools of the lower fish ladder. An access bridge was built from the backyard of the Rauschenberg house on Ladds Hill Road to the east side of the fish ladder. After much consideration, the course of the fish ladder was moved from its original proximity to a house foundation. This move involved blasting a channel, which was successfully completed. The new pools will be operable before the 2013 alewife run.



Fundraising was also very successful in 2012. In November 2011, the project received a \$92,500 grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation which required \$116,000 in matching funds. The funds were raised – again through community fund-raising events (Bean Supper, Spring Festival, and Fall Soup and Chowder Festival), donations, and grants. In all, \$197,029.78 was spent on the fish ladder restoration in 2012.

The fish ladder restoration couldn't be happening without the collaboration of the Nobleboro Historical Society and the commitment and dedication of many individuals and organizations. Sincere and heartfelt thanks to all involved—the project couldn't happen without each and every one of you! WE are making it happen!

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration – 2013

Work on the fish ladder progressed well in 2013. During the winter and spring, the upper part of the lower third of the ladder was completely rebuilt. Nine pools were formed in a section that worked particularly poorly in the past. The new pools worked well and, with more than three-fourths



of the ladder now re-built, alewives passed up easily. A total of 912,930 were counted entering the lake to spawn in the spring of 2013 – an all-time record! Work on the lowest, final section of the fish ladder began in November.

The community turned out again to help raise funds for the fish ladder restoration. Events again included a bean supper in March, the Fish Ladder Restoration Festival on Memorial Day weekend, and the fall soup and chowder festival on Columbus Day weekend. In partnership with the Nobleboro Historical Society, we received a number of significant grants – from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (\$135,000), the Elmina Sewell Foundation (\$75,000), the Horizon Foundation (\$20,000) and the Davis Conservation Foundation (\$10,000).

Thanks to one and all for your commitment to the restoration, to alewives, and to this important part of our wonderful town.

Damariscotta Mills Fish Ladder Restoration – 2014

With the successful completion of the 2014 project, the fish ladder restoration is nearly finished. Since 2007, we have re-built 68 pools so that we now have an efficient fish ladder that will work well for decades to come. All that remains to be completed is more capping and the construction of one more pool at the bottom of the ladder. The work is a collaboration of the Towns of Nobleboro and Newcastle and the Nobleboro Historical Society.

In 2014, the lowest and final sixteen pools in the fish ladder were re-built during the winter and early spring and the capping was completed on an additional 30 pools that had been previously constructed. Jorgensen Landscaping of Bath again carried out the project. The Jorgensen crew built a huge plastic tent over the work area and, heated with propane heaters, they worked (almost) comfortably through some challenging winter weather. The work is truly exceptional and it's been enjoyed by thousands of visitors as well as the fish.

The success of the fish ladder restoration is measured by the number of alewives reaching Damariscotta Lake to spawn. In 2014, a total of 1,066,314 alewives were counted! It's unlikely that more than a million fish ever reached the lake to spawn, even in the glory days of fish harvesting during the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The fish ladder now works efficiently and the fish have responded. We should have great runs now into the foreseeable future.

In 2013-2014, we had help from a number of foundations including the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, the Sewell Foundation, the Horizon Foundation, the Davis Conservation Foundation, and the Edward A. Myers Marine Conservation Fund. In addition, area businesses helped enormously with donations and sponsorships. Finally, many, many individuals volunteered their help at festivals and other events, made donations, and came to enjoy the rewards of all this work. We, as a community, have preserved our historic fish ladder and the alewives and other fish that rely on it for passage between fresh and salt water.

Thanks to one and all—we did it!! We now have some finishing touches to complete in the coming years.

Office of the Sheriff Lincoln County, Maine

Sheriff Todd B. Brackett and his staff wish to thank the citizens of Nobleboro for their support and make the following report for 2015.

The Sheriff's Office responded to 1647 calls for service for the Town of Nobleboro. This number is an increase from 2014. The calls include 43 Traffic Accidents, 64 Reports/Investigation of crimes against individuals/property, 755 Property checks, 270 Traffic Assists/Offenses, 29 9-1-1 Hang Up Investigations, 78 Business/Residential Alarms and 29 assists to residents. The numbers you see above are only a partial listing of actual services provided in 2015.

The Special Services Division is comprised of the Detective Division, Transport Division and Court Security and Animal Control. This Division is commanded by Lieutenant Michael Murphy. The Detective Division continues its quest to solve major property crimes and crimes committed against children. The Detective Division also supports other law enforcement agencies within the county when requested.

The Animal Control Officer program has really taken shape in 2015. There are currently 11 towns within Lincoln County who contract with the Sheriff's Office for ACO services. We have five part time ACOs who have all attended the mandatory basic ACO training required by the State of Maine. The program has really taken off and showing to be quite successful.

In January of 2015, Detective Robert McFetridge retired from the Sheriff's Office after three decades of serving the people of the State of Maine as a law enforcement officer. We wish Bob and his family well in his retirement years.

On April 4, 2015, Deputy Jared Mitkus was promoted to the rank of Detective to fill a vacancy within that division. Detective Mitkus's experience and investigational craftiness will be a great addition to an already seasoned group of detectives.

The Transport Team works extremely hard on the diversion program, reducing the cost of housing inmates at Two Bridges Regional Jail. The diversion program continues to save the County of Lincoln thousands of dollars in incarceration costs. Deputy James Read continues to excel in managing inmates on diversion contracts, lowering the number of bed days that they would be housed at TBRJ. Programs Deputy Eleanor Grover

retired from full time employment after 19 years with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office on January 1, 2015. Not to worry, Eleanor will be working on a part time basis doing community projects with Two Bridges inmates throughout Lincoln and Sagadahoc Counties.

The Patrol Division, commanded by Lieutenant Rand Maker, continues on its steady and increasing pace of responding to day to day calls for service. The Sheriff's Office in 2015 received another block of grants from the Maine Department of Public Safety to conduct seatbelt, speed and OUI enforcement details. The details paid for by the grant focus solely on enforcement of those areas which are most commonly reported on day to day complaints. These details do not interfere with the patrol division's day to day calls for service.

In October of 2015, Senior Patrol Sergeant Daniel Sceviour retired after twenty-five years of serving the people of Lincoln County. Dan had the respect of all Sheriff's Office employees and was well respected in the community for which he served. We wish Dan and Susan good times with their two sons in a much warmer climate.

In April of 2015, Caleb Poirier was hired as a full time patrol deputy, filling a vacancy within that division. Caleb had already attended the full time law enforcement academy and after his field training is complete here at the Sheriff's Office, he will be ready to go. We welcome Caleb to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office family.

Distracted driving continues to be one of the leading causation factors for motor vehicle crashes. Please don't be a statistic, pay attention to your driving. Your life or the life of another person could depend on it.

The Sheriff's Office Administrative Division continues to serve the public's needs regarding civil process issues and questions about reports taken by deputies. Karen, Amy and Penny will be happy to assist in any way they can.

The Civil Division remains steady with civil paperwork service throughout the county. There were 68 civil papers served in Nobleboro in 2015.

As your Sheriff, it remains a priority to keep the lines of communication open to each citizen I serve. Please do not hesitate to bring your public safety concerns to me directly or to any member of my staff. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office cares about its reputation, our community and the people we serve.

Dear Friends of Nobleboro:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Much of my time in Washington this past year has been devoted to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence. Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests. Also included in the bill are several measures I secured to promote local input, fund education technology initiatives, and explore new strategies to increase student access to the internet outside of school.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My amendments to the Every Student Succeeds Act will promote the type of work already occurring in Washington County, where students who lack broadband access are able to check out mobile hotspots from their local libraries. Additionally, a bill I co-sponsored, the Community Broadband Act, helped pave the way for the FCC to enact rules protecting the ability of municipalities to invest in better broadband. I am excited by Maine's leadership on this important economic development issue and will continue to support local efforts in this area.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine

and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions I co-sponsored to cut red tape and improve predictability and timeliness by streamlining the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small businesses across the state.

Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes and would generate resources for years to come. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; co-sponsoring a Senate-passed bill that addresses mothers struggling with addiction and the alarming effect it has on newborns; co-sponsoring the TREAT Act, which expands the ability of medical specialists to provide life-saving medication-assisted therapies for patients battling heroin and prescription drug addiction; and calling on the Commander of the U.S. Southern Command to increase efforts to stop the flow of heroin at our southern border.

I like to think of Maine as a big small town - and in a small town, the leaders are accessible and eager to listen. In that spirit, I've made it a priority to stay connected with people from all over Maine who e-mail, write, and call with suggestions or questions. If I can ever assist in your interaction with a federal agency, or you have thoughts, concerns, or personal input on a matter that is currently before Congress, I hope you will contact me, let me know where you stand, and engage in this critical part of democracy. Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from 2015.

Growing the economy by encouraging job creation was and remains my top priority. The tax-relief bill signed into law at the close of last year contains three key provisions I authored to help foster job creation and provide small businesses with the certainty they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. Another provision I authored that became law last year gives a boost to both Maine's economy and traffic safety. This provision permanently changed the federal law that previously had forced the heaviest trucks onto our country roads and downtown streets, rather than allowing them to use Maine's federal Interstates. In addition, I was glad to help secure another significant award for the University of Maine's deepwater offshore wind initiative, which has the potential to advance an emerging industry and create thousands of good jobs in our state.

Maine's historic contributions to our nation's defense must continue. In 2015, I secured funding toward a much-needed additional Navy destroyer, likely to be built at Bath Iron Works. Modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that I have long advocated for were also completed, as were projects for the Maine National Guard.

I was also deeply involved in crafting the new education reform law to better empower states and communities in setting educational policy for their students. The law also extends a program I co-authored that provides additional assistance to rural schools, which has greatly benefitted our state. A \$250 tax deduction I authored in 2002 for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies was also made permanent last year.

As a result of a scientific evaluation of the nutritional value of potatoes required by a law that I wrote, the wholesome fresh potato finally was included in the federal WIC nutrition program. I also worked on other issues important to Maine's farmers and growers, including research on wild blueberries and pollinating bees.

As Chairman of the Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have made combating veterans' homelessness a priority. This year's housing funding law includes \$60 million for 8,000 new supportive housing vouchers

for homeless veterans. Since this program began in 2008, the number of homeless veterans nationwide has dropped by one third. Maine has received nearly 200 vouchers to support homeless veterans.

Last year, I became Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee. My top three priorities for the committee are retirement security, investing more in biomedical research, and fighting fraud and financial abuses targeting our nation's seniors. I advocated for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. The Senate also unanimously passed my bill to support family caregivers. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance and has already received more than 1,000 calls.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2015 ended, I cast my 6,072nd consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. I appreciate the opportunity to give you an update on my work in Maine and Washington. It continues to be a great honor to serve the people of Maine's 1st District in Congress.

Here at home, I had the chance to visit many communities to help celebrate their victories and discuss their concerns—critical feedback to take to Washington. And over the last year, my hard-working staff has helped hundreds of constituents on their issues with federal programs and agencies.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Nobleboro, as of and for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town

of Nobleboro as of December 31, 2015 and 2014, and the respective changes in financial position, and where applicable, cash flows thereof for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters*Required Supplementary Information*

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Nobleboro's basic financial statements. The introductory section, combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements, and statistical section are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements.

The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

The introductory and statistical sections have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

Management's Discussion and Analysis Year Ended December 31, 2015

As management of the Town of Nobleboro, Maine, we offer readers of the Town of Nobleboro, Maine's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town of Nobleboro for the year ended December 31, 2015. We encourage readers to consider the information presented in conjunction with additional information that we have furnished in our letter of transmittal, the basic financial statements, and the accompanying notes to those financial statements.

ADMINISTRATIVE NOTES

Frances and Heather Key Scholarship

In 2014 the school was notified that they had been given \$50,000.00 to establish the Frances and Heather Key Scholarship. The Scholarship will be for high school graduates and will be awarded as the income from the fund increases. We hope to be able to award scholarships on a yearly basis.

Fish Stream Restoration Project

A very active group of people, headed by Deb Wilson, worked hard to raise a lot of money to rebuild the fish ladder. The fish ladder is the stream that allows the alewives to pass from the Damariscotta River into the Damariscotta Lake to spawn in the spring. The fish ladder was in need of a lot of repairs.

In 2014 the group took in \$196,405 in grants, donations and sales. Along with a balance forward of \$126,390 they had \$322,785 to work with. In 2014 they spent \$281,835 in major reconstruction of the lower pools. This has almost completed the reconstruction of all the pools.

With a balance forward of \$40,956 they continued doing some minor work to finish the lower pools and finished the year with a balance of \$39,186. If you have not visited the fish ladder since this work began, you should take time to view the magnificent work that has been done.

Overview of Finances

The economy seems to be improving. In 2015 we saw excise tax increase by 13% for a total of \$46,368. We also saw a decrease in outstanding property taxes at the end of 2015.

The Town has very little debt. We owe one final payment on the fire truck for a total of \$33,752. Overall the Town of Nobleboro is in very good shape financially with little debt and a healthy surplus. This makes for a good financial situation for the Town.

It is very important that you come to town meeting to vote on the 2016 budget.

THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements presented herein include all the activities of the Town of Nobleboro, Maine (the Town) using the integrated approach as prescribed by GASB Statement No. 34.

The Government-Wide Financial Statements present the financial picture of

the Town from the economic resources measurement focus using the accrual basis of accounting. They present governmental activities and business-type activities separately. These statements include all assets of the Town (including infrastructure) as well as all liabilities (including long-term debt). Additionally, certain eliminations have occurred as prescribed by the statement in regards to interfund activity, payables, and receivables.

The Fund Financial Statements include statements for each of the three categories of activities - governmental, business-type, and fiduciary. The governmental activities are prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus and modified accrual basis of accounting. The business-type activities are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The fiduciary activities are agency funds, which only report a balance sheet and do not have a measurement focus. Reconciliation of the Fund Financial Statements to the Government-Wide Financial Statements is provided to explain the differences created by the integrated approach.

REPORTING THE TOWN AS A WHOLE

The Statement of Net Position (see Exhibit A) and the Statement of Activities (see Exhibit B) report information about the Town as a whole and its activities. These statements include all assets and liabilities of the Town using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private sector companies. All of the current year’s revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Town’s Net Position and changes to it. Net position is the difference between assets and liabilities, which is one way to measure the Town’s financial health or financial position. Over time, increases and decreases in the Town’s net position are indicators of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Other factors to consider are changes to the Town’s property tax base and the condition of the Town’s infrastructure.

In the Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities we separate the Town’s basic governmental activities as:

Property taxes, excise taxes, fees, interest income, and state and federal grants finance these activities. Detail relating to the activities is in Schedules A-2 and A-4.

Business-type activities include the Nobleboro/Jefferson Transfer Station. Both towns share and operate this as a business entity. Details of this activity are in Schedule A-15.

REPORTING THE TOWN’S MOST SIGNIFICANT FUNDS

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the most significant funds, not the Town as a whole. Management established many funds to

help it control and manage money for particular purposes to show that it is meeting legal responsibilities for using certain taxes, grants, or other money.

Governmental Funds - All of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed shorter-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides.

Governmental fund information helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent on the near future to finance the Town's programs. The differences of results in the Governmental Fund financial statements to those in the Government-Wide financial statements are explained in reconciliation statements.

THE TOWN AS A WHOLE
(Government-Wide Financial Analysis)

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of the Town's financial position. In the case of Nobleboro, assets exceed liabilities by \$4,344,729 at the close of calendar year 2015 compared to \$4,483,224 at the close of 2014.

Our current debt is \$33,752.

The cost of all Governmental Activities was \$4,631,892.72. Charges for services of \$80,992.82, operating grants and contributions of \$580,287.59, and capital grants and contributions of \$63,277.23 reduced the cost to the Town to \$3,907,335.08 that we financed by property taxes. (total cost less revenues generated by the activities). The net cost shows the financial burden that was placed on the Town's taxpayers by each of the functions with a comparison to 2012, 2013 and 2014.

Notes To Financial Statements – December 31, 2015

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The accounting policies of the Town of Nobleboro conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units.

1. Financial Reporting Entity

The Town of Nobleboro was incorporated in 1788. The Town operates under a town meeting form of government.

In evaluating the Town of Nobleboro as a reporting entity, management has addressed all potential component units. The primary criteria for including a component reporting entity are the exercise of financial accountability by the Town of Nobleboro's municipal officials.

The Town's financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is responsible for establishing Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for state and local governments through its pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations). Governments are also required to follow the pronouncements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued through November 30, 1989 (when applicable) that do not conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant accounting policies established in GAAP are used by the Town as discussed below.

In June 1999, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) unanimously approved Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments*. Certain significant changes in the Statement include the following:

1.) Financial statements now include:

- A Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) section providing an analysis of the Town's overall financial position and results of operations.
- Financial statements prepared using full accrual accounting for all of the Town's activities, including infrastructure (roads, bridges, etc.).

2.) A change in the fund financial statements to focus on the major funds.

2. Basic Financial Statements - Government-Wide Statements

The Town's basic financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the Town as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the Town's major funds). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements categorize primary activities as governmental. The Town's fire protection, recreation, public works, and general administrative services are classified as governmental activities.

In the government-wide Statements of Net Position, the governmental column is presented on a consolidated basis by column, and is reported on a full accrual, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The Town's net position is reported in three parts - net invested in capital assets; restricted; and unrestricted. The Town first utilizes restricted resources to finance qualifying activities.

The government-wide Statements of Activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the Town's functions and business-type activities (fire, public works, administrative, etc.). The functions are also supported by general government revenues (property, certain intergovernmental revenues, fines, permits, and charges,

etc.). The Statements of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation) by related program revenues, and operating and capital grants. Program revenues must be directly associated with the function (fire, public works, etc.). Operating grants include operating-specific and discretionary (either operating or capital) grants while the capital grants column reflects capital-specific grants.

The net costs (by function or business-type activity) are normally covered by general revenue (property, intergovernmental revenues, interest income, etc.).

This government-wide focus is more on the sustainability of the Town as an entity and the change in the Town's net position resulting from the current year's activities.

3. Basic Financial Statements - Fund Financial Statements

The financial transactions of the Town are reported in individual funds in the fund financial statements. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures/expenses. The various funds are reported by generic classification within the financial statements.

The following fund types are used by the Town:

a. Governmental Funds:

The focus of the governmental funds' measurement (in the fund statements) is upon determination of financial position and changes in financial position (sources, uses, and balances of financial resources) rather than upon net income. The following is a description of the governmental funds of the Town:

1. General Fund:

General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

2. Capital Projects Funds:

Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition of a fire truck.

3. Fiduciary Funds:

Fiduciary Funds are used to report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore are not available to support town programs. The reporting focus is on net position and changes in net position and is reported using accounting principles similar to proprietary funds.

The emphasis in fund financial statements is on the major funds in either the governmental or business-type activities categories. Nonmajor funds by category are summarized into a single column. GASB No. 34 sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, liabilities, revenues, or expenditures/expenses of either fund category) for the determination of major funds.

The Town's fiduciary funds are presented in the fiduciary fund financial statements. Since by definition these assets are being held for the benefit of a third party and cannot be used to address activities or obligations of the government, these funds are not incorporated into the government-wide statements.

4. Proprietary Fund:

The Proprietary Fund is the fund used to account for all financial resources relating to the Nobleboro-Jefferson Transfer Facility. The generally accepted accounting principles applicable are those similar to business in the private sector.

4. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures/expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made regardless of the measurement focus applied:

a. Accrual:

Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements and fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

b. Modified Accrual:

The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e. both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt, if any, is recognized when due.

5. Financial Statement Amounts

a. Cash and Cash Equivalents:

The Town has defined cash and cash equivalents to include cash on hand, demand deposits, and cash with fiscal agents. Statutes authorize the Treasurer of the Town, as directed by the municipal officers, to invest all municipal funds, including reserve and trust funds, to the extent that the terms of the instrument, order, or article creating the fund do not prohibit the investment in financial institutions as described in Section 5706 MRSA and securities as described in Sections 5711 through 5717 MRSA.

b. Investments:

Investments are stated at fair market value.

c. Capital Assets:

Capital Assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$2,000.00 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings	20-50 Years	Machinery and Equipment	3-10 Years
Improvements	10-20 Years	Other Infrastructure	10-50 Years

d. Revenues:

Substantially, all governmental fund revenues are accrued. Property taxes are billed and collected within the same period in which the taxes are levied. In applying GASB No. 33 to grant revenues, the provider recognizes liabilities and expenses and the recipient recognizes receivables and revenue when the applicable eligibility requirements, including time requirements, are met. Resources transmitted before the eligibility requirements are met are reported as advances by the provider and deferred revenue by the recipient.

e. Expenditures:

Expenditures are recognized when the related fund liability is incurred. Inventory costs are reported in the period when inventory items are used, rather than in the period purchased.

f. Fund Balance:

In accordance with GASB Statement No. 54, the Town employs terminology and classifications for fund balance items as follows:

Nonexpendable fund balances include amounts that are not expected to be converted to cash, or that are legally required to be maintained intact. The fund balance of the Town's Trust Funds are classified as nonexpendable.

Restricted fund balances are amounts that can be used only for specific purposes because of legislation or restrictions imposed by donors. The fund balances of the Special Revenue Funds are classified as restricted.

Committed fund balances are amounts that can be used only for specific purposes because of a formal action taken by town government. Budget carry forward amounts (other than the school budget), the fund balances in the Capital Projects Fund, and the Cemetery Maintenance Fund are in this category.

Assigned fund balances are resources that are constrained by the government's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed.

Unassigned fund balance is all amounts in the General Fund that are not assigned to another category. Only the General Fund can have an unassigned fund balance.

g. Deferred Inflows and Outflows of Resources:

In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense) until that time. The deferred outflows relate to the net pension liability, which include the Town's contributions subsequent to the measurement date, which is recognized as a reduction of the net pension liability in the subsequent year. They also include changes in assumptions, differences between expected and actual experience, and changes in proportion and differences between Town contributions and proportionate share of contributions, which are deferred and amortized over the average, expected remaining service lives of active and inactive members in the plan.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The deferred inflows relate to the net pension liability, which include the differences between expected and actual experience and changes in proportion and differences between Town contributions and proportionate share of contributions, which is deferred and amortized over the average expected remaining service lives of active and inactive members in the plan. They also include the net difference between projected and actual earnings on pension plan investments, which is deferred and amortized over a five-year period.

h. Use of Estimates:

The presentation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted

accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE B - CASH:

Cash

The Town's cash is categorized to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the Town at year-end. These Categories are defined as follows:

Category #1 - Insured or collateralized with securities held by the Town or by its agent in the Town's name.

Category #2 - Collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the Town's name.

Category #3 - Uncollateralized (This includes any bank balance that is collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution, or by its trust department or agent but not in the Town's name.)

Historically, the Town has not appropriated funds for abatements but rather funds the expenditures through other unappropriated revenues or undesignated fund balance.

NOTE H - REVENUE RECOGNITION - PROPERTY TAXES:

The Town's property tax for the current year was levied June 17, 2015 on the assessed value listed as of April 1, 2015 for all taxable real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due September 30, 2015 with interest at 7% per annum or part thereof commencing October 1, 2015.

Tax liens are filed against delinquent real estate taxpayers after eight months but

within one year of the original tax commitment. If the tax, interest, and costs have not been paid eighteen months after the filing of a lien certificate then the lien is automatically foreclosed.

The National Council on Governmental Accounting (N.C.G.A.) Interpretation No. 3 requires that property tax revenue be recognized only to the extent it will be collected within sixty days following the year end. The deferred tax revenue shown on the balance sheet represents property taxes not expected to be collected within sixty days after the year end.

Property taxes are recognized when they become available. Available includes those taxes expected to be collected within sixty days after year end as stated above.

NOTE L - TAX LIENS:

At a special town meeting, the Town voted to waive the foreclosure of certain tax lien mortgages on real estate for taxes assessed against a taxpayer. The amounts waived total \$23,015.56 and are included in the total liens of \$95,395.90 and 2015 real estate taxes of \$175,901.04.

NOTE M - RISK MANAGEMENT:

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. All significant losses are covered by commercial insurance. There has been no significant reduction in insurance coverage. Settlement amounts have not exceeded insurance coverage for the current year or the three prior years.

NOTE N - OVERLAPPING DEBT:

The Town of Nobleboro is situated in Lincoln County and is therefore subject to annual assessment of its proportional share of County expenses. Long-term debt outstanding in Lincoln County, for which the Town of Nobleboro would be proportionally responsible in the event the County defaulted, amounted to

\$6,190,000.00 at December 31, 2015. The Town of Nobleboro's share would be 4.288% of the debt, or approximately \$265,427.00.

NOTE O - LEASE:

On June 1, 2005 the Town entered into a fifteen (15) year lease with Deborah Wilson and Mark Becker for the use of property in the Mills section of Town. The Town receives annual rent of one dollar (\$1.00) for the use of the town landing property.

NOTE P - SNOW REMOVAL:

On July 17, 2013 the Town entered into a five (5) year snow removal contract with Hagar Enterprises, Inc.

NOTE Q - MAINE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM:

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Pensions - For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows for resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Maine Public Employees Retirement System State Employee and Teacher Plan (SETP Plan) and additions to/deductions from the Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the Plans. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Maine Public Employees Retirement System

General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan Description - Teaching-certified employees of the Town are provided with pensions through the Maine Public Employees Retirement System State Employee and Teacher Plan (SETP Plan), cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans, administered by the Maine Public Employees Retirement System (MPERS). Benefit terms are established in Maine statute. MPERS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at www.maineipers.org.

Benefits provided - The SETP Plan provide defined retirement benefits based on members' average final compensation and service credit earned as of retirement. Vesting (i.e. eligibility for benefits upon reaching qualification) occurs upon the earning of five years of service credit. In some cases, vesting occurs on the earning of one year of service credit immediately preceding retirement at or after normal retirement age. For SETP members, normal retirement age is 60, 62, or 65. The normal retirement age is determined by whether a member had met certain creditable service requirements on specific dates, as established by statute. The monthly benefit of members who retire before normal retirement age by virtue of having at least 25 years of service credit is reduced by a statutorily prescribed factor for each year of age that a member is below her/his normal retirement age at retirement. MPERS also provides disability and death benefits, which are established by statute.

Contributions - Employee contribution rates are defined by law or Board rule

and depend on the terms of the plan under which an employee is covered. Employer contributions are determined by actuarial valuations. The contractually required contribution rates are actuarially determined as an amount that, when combined with employee contributions, is expected to finance the costs of benefits earned by employees during the year, with an additional amount to finance any unfunded accrued liability.

SETP Plan - Maine statute requires the State to contribute a portion of the Town's contractually required contributions. Employees are required to contribute 7.65% of their annual pay. The Town of Nobleboro's contractually required contribution rate for the year ended December 31, 2015, was between 13.38% and 15.68% of annual payroll of which between 2.65% and 3.36% of payroll was required from the Town and \$136,819.57 was required from the State. Contributions to the pension plan from the Town was \$31,374.35 for the year ended December 31, 2015.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

The net pension liabilities were measured as of June 30, 2014 and the total pension liabilities used to calculate the net pension liabilities were determined by actuarial valuations as of that date. The Town's proportion of the net pension liabilities were based on projections of the Town's long-term share of contributions to the pension plans relative to the projected contributions of all participating School Administrative Units and the State (SETP Plan), actuarially determined.

SETP Plan - At June 30, 2014, the Town reported a liability for its proportionate share of the net pension liability that reflected a reduction for State pension support provided to the Town. The amount recognized by the Town as its proportionate share of the net pension liability, the related State support, and the total portion of the net pension liability that was associated with the Town were as follows:

Mortality rates were based on the RP2000 Combined Mortality Table projected forward to 2015 using Scale AA.

The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2014 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period July 1, 2005 to June 30, 2010.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighing the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in the pension plan’s target asset allocation as of June 30, 2014 are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate - The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.125% for the SETP Plan. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rates assumed that employee contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that contributions from participating local districts will be made at contractually required rates, actuarially determined. Based on these assumptions,

the pension plans' fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current active and inactive employees. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liabilities.

Sensitivity of the Town of Nobleboro's proportionate share of the net pension liabilities to changes in the discount rate - The following presents the Town's proportionate share of the net pension liability calculated using the discount rate of 7.125% for the SETP Plan, as well as what the Town's proportionate share of the net pension liability would be if it were calculated using the discount rate that is 1 percentage-point lower 6.125% for SETP Plan or 1 percentage-point higher 8.125% for SETP Plan than the current rate:
